WILLIAM JAMES FOX
Following an operation William James Fox passed away at Guelph General Hospital, on Thursday, Feb. 3rd, in his 36th year. Deceased was born in the county of Tyrone, and after living in Tadragee, County Armagh, Ireland, came to Canada nine years ago. He has been a resident of Georgetown and vicinity ever since coming to this country and was highly respected by all who knew him. One year ago he married Nellie Parton of Georgetown, who survives. A brother, John, also of Georgetown, survives, and five brothers and two sisters in the Old Country. He was a member of Loyal Orange Lodge #46, G. L. Williams, and Cross and Crown R.E.P. 797, Georgetown. He was a member of the Anglican church. The funeral was in charge of the Orange Lodge. The church service was conducted by Rev. G. O. Thompson and the Orange service by Master George Ingles, assisted by County Master Marsales of Acton. Over forty members of the Orange Order were present. The pall-bearers were: Bros. WILLIAM GILBERT MCKAY
Georgetown's oldest resident, William Gilbert McKay, passed away at his home on Charles St., on Thursday, February 3rd, in his 89th year. Deceased was a son of the late Elizabeth Telford and Hugh McKay and was born in Trafalgar, Ontario, in 1849. He came to Georgetown with his parents in 1853, and has resided here continuously ever since. When sixteen years of age he went into the grocery business which his father had established and continued to carry on the same until he retired in 1932. On Nov. 24th, 1874 he married Frances Barber who predeceased him 21 years ago last December. He is survived by a family of two daughters and one son, Mrs. F. H. Moore, Courtenay, Vancouver Island, B.C., Mr. O. T. McKay and Mrs. P. B. Coffin, Georgetown. One sister, Mrs. J. C. Wetherald of Georgetown also survives. Deceased was a member of the Presbyterian Church and an honorable man who during his long business career in Georgetown was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. REV. E. VESEY DIES AGED 84

Rev. Eustace Allix Vesey, 84, a retired Anglican clergyman, died Saturday at his home, 84 Oakwood Ave., Toronto.

Born in Lawrence Court, Huntingdon, Eng., Mr. Vesey received his education at Rugby School, England, and later took his divinity course at Montreal Diocesan College. His studies were interrupted when he assumed his duties as a missionary in the Diocese of Algoma. He was ordained deacon at Port Sydney and priest at Parry Sound. He was rector of the Pro-Cathedral of St. Luke at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. He later was appointed Rural Dean of Algoma.

Taking up work in the Diocese of Niagara, he served parishes at Harrison, Georgetown and St. James' Church, Guelph. In 1906 he joined the late Canon Hart at St. Mary the Virgin, Toronto, and in 1908 started the Mission of St. Edmund's, being the first rector, appointed in 1912. He retired in 1926.

Surviving are his widow, Isabella Kirk Vesey and one daughter, Gwendoline Allix Vesey, of Toronto.

MRS. FISHER SUGGESTS FOR DINNER

Canadian Oven-Fried Fish—Using filets or steaks of any desired kind of Canadian fish, wipe each piece carefully with a damp cloth wrung out in cold salted water. Dip each piece in egg, beaten slightly with a tablespoon of cold water, or in salted milk. Toss the fish into a pan or bowl of finely-sifted, dry bread crumbs, coating each piece of fish with the crumbs. (Use one hand for dipping the fish in the liquid and the other for working with the crumbs.) Place the pieces of fish on a greased baking pan, add salt, and sprinkle lightly with cooking oil. Leave the fish in a hot oven—500 degrees F. until it has lost its watery colour and no juices escapes when the slices are pierced with a knitting needle. The length of cooking time required depends on the thickness of the fish; not more than ten minutes in a hot oven is needed for a piece of fish an inch thick. Over-cooking is the most common mistake in fish cookery.
