NEW BRIDGE PLANNED AT BURLINGTON CANAL

Tentative plans for the new bridge at the Burlington canal in connection with the completion of the four-lane highway route to Niagara Falls were announced by the Ontario Department of highways on Tuesday last. The bridge development will extend nearly two miles, including its approaches and concrete pavement linking the new middle road at the Beach cut-off. The bridge span will be a 120-foot high level steel structure with approaches extending over 800 feet, according to plans now being finally completed by the department.
