RADIO NOTES

Many discussions have taken place as to the advantages or disadvantages CBL, the new radio transmitter at Hornby. A few-lines may help clarify the situation.

At the outset, no one in this vicini ty complains that he is unable "get" OBL. It has overcome altogether the objection often , heard to the old station CROT; that a Mexican station interferred with it.
