RADIO NOTES

CBL

Many discussions have taken place as to the advantages or disadvantages of CBL, the new radio transmitter at Hornby. A few lines may help to clarify the situation.

At the outset, no one in this vicinity complains that he is unable to "get" CBL. It has overcome altogether the objection often heard to the old station CROZ; that a Mexican station interfered with it. For the most part we hear laments that the new transmitter is "too strong," that it "spreads too far on the dial," or that the "volume cannot be cut-down without affecting the tone."

Let us deal first with the fact that CBL is "too strong." In other words when the station is tuned in it comes in with a bang. This condition is only objectionable on radios (regardless of make) which were manufactured previous to 1932. Any reasonably modern receiver—with the possible exception of "midgets"—utilizes a circuit known as automatic volume control, or AVC. This circuit, as its name implies, adjusts the sensitivity of the receiver to the strength of the station being received. Thus the knob on the radio which controls the volume may be turned to any position, no matter what station is being received. Incidentally, automatic volume control corrects, to a great extent, the condition known as "fading" on distant stations.

The fact that CBL spreads too much may be traced to several things. Even on a modern radio, the automatic volume control feature may make the station seem to spread over too many degrees on the dial. The reason is this: as the dial is turned away from CBL, the signal from the Hornby transmitter becomes weaker—BUT the AVC circuit, always on the job, tries to keep the volume the same until the signal disappears altogether. Naturally this takes more space on the dial for CBL than for weaker stations; BUT REMEMBER, if there is a reasonably strong station—such as W. I. C. or C. M. S.—which there is not at the present time, the frequency of CBL, the apparent "broad tuning" is not noticeable. However, on some of the older receivers, again regardless of make, the circuit is actually broad tuning and consequently any strong signal will give trouble whether there is another station close to it or not. In some such cases, reducing the length of the aerial to about 50 feet inclusive of lead-in will be of some help. Do I hear someone say, "I never use an aerial on my radio. I just run it on the ground." Let me say to him, "You have no right to complain about interference of any kind, either interfering stations, or noisy reception until you have a proper aerial, properly installed." Don't misunderstand me. If the owner is satisfied with the reception he is getting, it is up to him whether he installs an aerial or not, but I repeat, he has no right to complain unless he has one.

In any case of broad tuning on CBL a wave trap will help, but only on that station. In other words, the radio will still be "broad," and the owner must either purchase a more modern set or be content with "out of date" reception in accordance with the age of his receiver.

In cases where the radio fan is not able to reduce the volume of CBL without affecting the tone of the receiver, the condition can always be corrected. In some instances a slight circuit change is all that is necessary. In others a new volume control, either with or without a change in some of the tube types will overcome this trouble. A word of caution here, however. A radio fan whose receiver tunes very broadly as well, is advised to consider the idea of changing his radio for a more modern one (even if not for a 1938 model) BEFORE he spends money on an obsolete set that may be junked in the very near future.

Finally, don't expect 1938 results with a "new and buggy" radio, take the broader view, that any inconvenience which you may experience is your contribution to the progress of broadcasting in Canada. Remember that CBL is carrying Canadian programs to remote corners of the country, providing a service that is long overdue.
