IMPORTANCE OF WOOD AS FUEL

Department is Investigating Ways and Means to Extend Its Use

Canada's forests continue to be an important source of fuel, supplying about 15 to 20 per cent of the domestic requirements of the country, during the five year period 1931-35 the average annual cut of fuel wood in Canada was approximately 9,000,000 cords valued at about \$33,000,000.

Wood as a fuel has a very definite field. It is the mainstay of our rural regions and is much used for heating purposes in villages and towns in those parts of Canada where lack of coal deposits, prevents the population from securing cheap coal for domestic use. If methods of selling, marketing and burning firewood were improved the value of this fuel undoubtedly would be more appreciated. To this end the Forest Products Laboratories and the Testing and Research Laboratories of the Department of Mines and Resources, in operation with other organizations, are investigating ways and means of extending the use of wood for fuel.

It has been found that as a rule the fuel of seasoned wood depends generally on the weight per cubic foot, the heaviest woods naturally being of well seasoned sugar maple, beech or yellow birch split firewood weighs upwards of 4,000 pounds, whereas a similar cord of softwood may weigh less than two thirds as much. The relative value of the different wood fuels may, therefore, be approximately compared on the basis of their weights, at the same moisture contents. Two pounds of seasoned firewood are generally required to furnish the amount of heat obtainable from a pound of anthracite coal of good grade. Coal, however, is generally burned somewhat more efficiently, especially since much wood is used in heating installations designed for coal. In order to deliver the same amount of heat to a boiler as a pound of coal, a little more than two pounds of wood are required.

The extension of the use of wood for fuel, especially that not utilized in logging or in the saw mill, would be of great advantage to producer, consumer and labor, and if the cut of fuelwood is adequately regulated the increased demand may be expected to enhance the value of Canada's forest stands.

WOMEN AND UNEMPLOYMENT

If it is true, as various authorities have estimated, that the women of Canada control, directly or indirectly, approximately 87 per cent of the purchases made in the Dominion, they exercise a very potent influence on employment conditions.

If women, therefore, adopt the slogan, "Be Canadian—Buy Canadian", and decline, except when necessary, to purchase foreign-made goods then it would be interesting to see what the results on the employment situation would be. As a natural bargain hunter, no woman is going to "Buy Canadian" simply for patriotic reasons. Nor should she be expected to do so. But, where price and quality suit, in comparison to the foreign merchandise, it is to be hoped they will continue to use even more of their power in purchasing so that more of our people will be able to obtain work. Possibly, as the National Produced in Canada Association has suggested on many occasions, if the women of the land made an inventory of their own homes and pantries, for instance, they might be astounded how much they are spending on foreign goods at the expense of employment of their fellow-Canadians.
