And plaudits filled the air; But when I woke 'twas but a dream, And I felt glad no more, For Orangeville licked our Juniors. By a score of five to four. On well, it's just one of those 'inexplicable turns of fortune's wheel. Everything was coming our way — a one goal lead to take to the Dufferin town, it looked good — and then, may-be, a wee-bit of over-confidence, and here we are with nothing left but to get ready for another season. Of course it's disappointing to players and fans but after all we can't all win. Someone always has to be the loser, and next to a good winner is a good loser. In fact, it's far harder to be a good winner than a good loser. A good winner has to contend against a certain amount of egotism, while the loser can see often enough just those reasons which snatched victory from his grasp. The Georgetown team won the group championship last year. They did not have the same team this year and Orangeville did. If a thing's worth having, it's worth fighting for, and sooner or later, if we don't get discouraged by frequent rebuffs, the prize so earnestly fought for will be ours, and Georgetown Juniors be acclaimed champions in their class. IT WAS "hail, hail, the gang's all here" on the bus to Orangeville last Thursday night, and the chorus was none the less vibrant on the return trip, although the team failed to come through.

WE WONDER how far the Orangeville team will go in the playoffs. They must certainly be a good team if they won the championship from our Juniors by one goal.

DID YOU KNOW—that the Georgetown Juniors never had more than three goals scored against them in any game this year. That Orangeville and Georgetown both won the same number of games played during the group schedule and the play-offs. That Orangeville had the same team as last year (1937) when Georgetown won the group and that it is not since 1929 that they have had a winning team.

WHY BLAME BURROWS?—A few of the Georgetown fans were putting the cause of the Juniors' defeat on Burrows' doctory.
