RADIO FEE \$2.50 BATTERY SETS \$2.00

According to reports from Ottawa, the radio license fee will be \$2.50, with an exemption for battery sets.
The tax continues at the old rate of \$2 per year on battery sets on farms and in communities not served by electrical distribution lines. Only tourists' automobiles will be exempt. Canadian cars will pay \$2.50 to carry radios unless the order-in-council is further amended. The new tax is effective April 1st.
Approximately 150,000 battery-operated receiving sets are in use in Canada, according to technical officers of the transport department. Owners of these sets will continue to pay the former fee of \$2. It is estimated it costs approximately ten times as much to operate a battery set as to work an electrical one.
For some years it has been the practice of the department to permit the free use of radios in hospitals, schools and institutions operated by the federal and provincial governments. This concession is now being extended to any hospital, sanatorium or charitable institution, whether government owned or not.

RURAL POPULATION

During the past sixty years the increase in population in Ontario has been chiefly in the category designated urban. In 1871 the urban population numbered 356,000 and rural population 1,265,000 or 78 per cent of the total. In 1931 the urban population had increased to 2,096,000, but the rural population was only 1,336,000, or 39 per cent of the total. The number of occupied farms in the same sixty years showed an increase from 172,000 to 192,000, while the size of the average farms rose from 93.8 acres to 118.9. These two changes indicate a decrease in the size of the farm family and an increase in the total area of occupied land from 16,162,000 acres to 22,841,000 acres. The area improved however, showed a much greater percentage gain, rising from 8,834,000 acres to 13,273,000.

FAMOUS CRIMINAL LAWYER DIES IN HIS SLEEP

Clarence Darrow died in Chicago, March 13th.
The famed criminal attorney, whose long life was spent in defence of the accused and whose boast it was that the law never had taken the life of one he defended, died in his sleep of heart trouble aggravated by old age.
Death came in the apartment overlooking the University of Chicago campus, where he had lived for thirty years—the last five in virtual retirement. He would have been 81 next April 18th.
In the long career of the brilliant attorney, which included a term in the Illinois Legislature, his fame was gained by the apparently hopeless cases which he took and won.
Most recent of these was the defence of Mrs. Roland Granville Fortesque, Lieutenant Thomas Massie and two sailors in the Honolulu "honor" slaying in 1932. In the Massie case the defendants were found guilty of second-degree murder and were paroled after being held in technical custody for one hour.

They had been accused of the slaying of Joseph Kahohawa, which occurred after an alleged criminal attack on Mrs. Thalia Massie.
An agnostic who believed thoroughly in freedom of education as well as speech and thought, Darrow volunteered his services for the defense of John T. Scopes in the Dayton, Tenn., evolution trial in 1925.
It was the only time Darrow ever volunteered his services, and he explained later that he did so on the occasion because William Jennings Bryan, for whose fundamentalist ideas he held a deep dislike, had volunteered to assist the prosecution.
Most popularly associated with Darrow was the Leopold and Loeb case. Richard Loeb and Nathan Leopold were accused of the slaying of little Bobby Franks. Public opinion was running high when Darrow was asked to take the case.
"No client of mine was ever put to death, and I felt that it would almost, if not quite, kill me if it should ever happen," he said.
"It was 98, and very weary. I had grown tired of standing in the lean and lonely front line of facing the greatest enemy that ever confronted

man—public opinion.
"But I went in to do what I could for sanity and humanity against the wave of hatred and malice that, as ever, was masquerading under its usual nom de plume—justice."
Other principal cases in which Darrow played a leading role were: The defense of Eugene Debs, after the American railway strike in 1904; counsel for the United Mine Workers of America in the Pennsylvania anthracite coal arbitration in 1902; defense of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone against charges of murdering Governor Frank Steunenberg of Idaho in 1906; and the defense of the McNamara brothers for dynamiting the Los Angeles Times Building in 1911.
In one of his most widely quoted interviews he expressed his opinion of a "crazy world."
"There's plenty of wealth," he said, "but a rotten distribution of it. There's a tremendous supply of food, everywhere, and yet people are starving."
"It's all bughouse. I'll be glad to leave it."
