East Lambton remains in the Government fold, with Charles O. Fairbank, Reeve of Petrolia, retaining the seat made vacant by the death of Milton D. McVicar. With ten polls out of 123 unreported in Tuesday's Provincial by-election, the Liberal-Progressive had a majority of 2,482 over James A. Currie, Conservative.
