WILLIAM SPROWL
Citizens generally were shocked to learn of the death on Friday of William Sprowl. Until a week previous he had been about town as usual, greeting friends. On the Thursday previous to his death he was taken to his home at Lakehurst, where he had observed his eighty-fifth birthday just two weeks previously, on February 19th. William Sprowl was a son of the late John and Jane Sprowl, and was born at Peru, near Milton, Ontario, about 1843. He was joined in holy wedlock to Annie Watson. The farm home was on the third line in Esquesing, until twelve years ago, when Mr. and Mrs. Sprowl came to Acton and have enjoyed a period of relaxation from the strenuous duties of farm life in the home on Lake Avenue. Besides his widow he leaves to mourn his loss and revere his memory, one brother, James, in Esquesing, and one sister, Mrs. John Kinard, in Guelph. To all of these sympathies of many friends goes out at this time. William Sprowl was a man whom many esteemed. Outspoken in his opinions and firm in his convictions. He was of that staunch Scotch ancestry whose offspring have settled well in this section. He laid a solid foundation for the upbuilding of this community. He was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church and rarely indeed was he absent from its services. He was a lifelong Conservative. He died on Monday afternoon with service at the home conducted by his minister, Rev. H. L. Bennie. Interment was at Fairview cemetery, Acton. The pallbearers were Messrs. Wm. Lundsbrough, Tom Rumley, George Rossell, J. C. MacArthur, Wm. Kenney and Jas. Chalmers. -Free Press.

THOMAS E. PRICE
A native of Esquesing Township, and for many years a resident of Acton, Thomas Evans Price passed away in Hamilton on Wednesday of last week. He was a son of the late Thomas and Mary A. Price, and was born in 1860 at lot 27, concession 7, Esquesing township. Mr. and Mrs. Price were residents in Acton for many years, and Mr. Price was for some time Municipal Officer. In 1908 his first wife (nee Minnie Watson, of Norway) passed away here, and her two children received their early education. Following removal to Hamilton, he went overseas with the 120th Battalion and served in France. After returning from overseas, he married again, and resided in Hamilton until his death. Surviving are his widow, Annie Price; one daughter (Meta), Mrs. M. McCarthy, of Toronto, and one son, Robert of Detroit. Of a family of eleven there remain one sister, Mrs. S. Sinclair, of Toronto; and two brothers, James Albert and Howard, both of Hamilton. Four grandchildren also remain. To all who have been bereaved sympathy of many friends here goes out. The funeral was held on Friday from his late residence, Napier St., Hamilton. The services were held at the Johnstone & Rumley funeral home in Acton, where local friends met with the mourners for the interment in Fairview Cemetery. The Rev. Mr. McTavish, of the United Church in Hamilton where deceased was a regular attendant, conducted the funeral service. The pallbearers were a member of the Legion, and brothers and nephews. Many beautiful floral tributes also bore testimony to the esteem in which he was held. -Free Press.

STANLEY CUP WON BY CANADIENS

AMERICANS LOSE ALL THREE PLAY-OFF GAMES

The Midget N.H.L. Canadian team won the coveted Stanley Cup, when they defeated the American team in three straight play-off games. The score of the first game last Thursday night was 3 - 2, the second game Monday night 4 - 0, and the third game last night 4 - 1. The Canadiens were much the stronger team and dominated the play of the three games.

On Thursday night the Redwings will take on the Milton Maroons for the championship of the Halton mid-gut loop. The Maple Leafs and Black Hawks will also play for the Teasdale Trophy.

GEORGETOWN 8 - ACTON 4

In a Harris Cup game here last Friday night, Georgetown out-pointed Acton 8 to 4 in a wide open brand of hockey. Both teams skated fast, and the fair crowd of fans on hand for the game enjoyed seeing the two old rival teams back in action again. The Georgetown team went on a real scoring spree and bagged 8 goals; and with Malone playing well in the local net, kept Acton down to 4 goals. It was the second game for the Harris Cup, the first being a tie-game up in Acton 7 - 7 in overtime. Owing to it being late in the season the third game has been called off, and Georgetown will still retain the cup. Georgetown scored three times in the first period to the visitors once - Tost, Dewhurst and Sanderson, and Marzo for Acton doing the counting. Acton took the edge in the second period when Mooney, Norm and Bus Morton counted against two goals by Dewhurst. The local team finished off the contest with another trio of goals, when K.
