**CORRESPONDENCE**

Georgetown, April 19th, 1938.  
To the Editor of the Georgetown Herald.  
Dear Sir:  
Will you kindly permit us to place before our citizens the reason why we, as an organization, last week united with others in a deputation to our municipal council to oppose any extension in the hours of sale in the local beverage rooms. Taking for granted the right of every citizen to his own opinion, in all matters, we would point out that, united undividedly to that right, is the duty to see that one's opinion does not have issue, either through action or inaction, in any detriment to others.  
As a union of Christian women, we base our opposition to the sale of alcoholic beverages upon the principle of judgment laid down by the Master of men: "A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit. Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire. Whereby their fruits ye shall know them."  
Judged by this standard, what can be said in favor of the argument that a man has a right to "put an enemy into his mouth to steal away his brains," as Shakespeare so aptly phrased it?  
Both science and experience unite to condemn the use of alcohol as a beverage, and we submit that it is the duty of every citizen to bring to the study of this community problem a willingness to face all facts.  
The argument as to when beverage rooms should close is but a skirmish in the campaign of informed intelligent public opinion against a system unduly and in its effects upon individual and community life.
