### DRUNKEN DRIVER PENALTIES

Motor vehicles will be impounded for three months automatically under first convictions of drunk driving, laid under the Criminal Code, or of driving after a permit is suspended or revoked, under amendments to the Highway Traffic Act. The amendments also went into sterner light the offense of failing to return to the scene of an accident and ruled that in event of a second conviction the motor vehicle shall be impounded. Previously the impounding penalty applied only to the third offense.

### MANITOBA WOMAN LANDED WORLD'S BIGGEST TROUT

All records for lake trout were broken when Leone Hayes pulled a fish out of Lake Athapapuskow on the Flin Flon line of the Canadian National Railways in northern Manitoba. Her catch was 47 1/2 inches long and weighed 65 pounds. The world's record for lake trout up to that time was a fish caught in Quebec. It weighed 48 pounds.  
The big fish was shown in the Canadian Wilderness Exhibit at the Boston Sportsmen's Show and is being displayed at Detroit before going back to the Manitoba Legislative Building.

### 1939 License Plates

Samples of license plates which are to be used on motor vehicles in Ontario in 1939 will be run off at the Ontario Reformatory, Guelph, according to Dr. J. D. Heaslip, Superintendent at the institution. The new style plates will have to receive official government approval before work on the year's supply is started. The 1939 plates will be yellow and black, "with large numbers," according to an announcement made by Highways Minister T. E. McQueen. In a previous statement in the legislature, Mr. McQueen said he would "take the blame" for the much criticized 1938 plates, which are orange and blue.
