A HIGH WAGE COUNTRY

Although the \$375,000 Turgeon report in the textile industry quotes a reference of the International Labor Office to support its view that Canada is in the "least advanced group" among world countries in respect of the number of hours of work per week, it omits to point out that a similar study by the same authority shows Canada in the front rank in respect of hourly wages paid.

"The quotation as used recently by Sir James Wood in a booklet entitled "Insurance of Unemployment," is as follows:
"Canada is a high-wage country in the textile world. I make that statement on the authority of the International Labor Office which, in a study of wages the world over, classifies the countries into four groups: "In the first group are the countries of Asia—China, Japan and India—where hourly wages in gold in 1935-36 were less than 20 Swiss gold centimes. In a second group are five countries of Central and Eastern Europe—Austria, Hungary, Italy, Poland and Czechoslovakia—where hourly rates were approximately between 35 and 45 gold centimes. In a third group are countries such as Sweden, Germany and Great Britain, in which hourly rates were between 55 and 75 gold centimes. The fourth is formed by the United States and Canada, where wages were above 1 gold franc per hour."

Apart from its failure to reach any worthwhile conclusions as to the extent to which the textile industry is justifying its place in the Canadian economy, the Turgeon report falls in many respects to present a fair picture of the actual position of the industry.

MOUNTAIN SPA IS NEW ATTRACTION

Coincident with the opening of this national playground for summer activity, June 15 next, the Canadian Government will start operation of its new development at Miette Hot Springs, forty miles east of Jasper Village. This new attraction is a huge, modern swimming pool and a number of individual bath houses utilizing the highly mineralized waters which pour from the rocks high up in the mountains at Miette. The water does not originate from volcanic sources but secures its heat and curative qualities from its contact with chemicals in the rocks through which it gushes. There are five separate springs with an average temperature of 126 degrees F. Water in the pool will be maintained at a temperature of about 100 degrees F.

Although many people have visited and have been benefited by these waters, there were no adequate facilities to take care of visitors until the Government completed construction of the up-to-date swimming pool and bath houses last autumn. As yet, no hotel accommodation is available at the springs but the motor highway between the springs and Jasper Village makes them easy of access. Before construction of the pool was proceeded with by the Government, it had a series of thorough tests made of the water by its own chemists and they found it to be higher in quantity and quality of curative properties than the waters of the leading European spas.

BEING HARD-BOILED IS NOT DESIRABLE

The words "hard-boiled" have become too common in world affairs, Rev. Robert Graham, B.A., associate editor of the New Outlook, declared in a sermon to young people at a special service at Bellair United Church, Toronto. Mr. Graham said that it was a sad state of affairs when people denied the presence of sentiment in their lives.
"Some people nowadays profess dislike for sentiment," he said, as he pointed out the prevalence of the self-confessed "hard-boiled" person. Sentiment in writing, reading or thinking has come to be looked on as something childish, he said.
"Hard-boiled" are two words that have become too frequently used of late and too many people love to boast that they are "hard-boiled," he said. As a matter of fact, he said, it isn't anything to boast about, for the man or woman who does not possess a heart and cannot feel sentimental at times is dead.
"And the man or woman or business firm who knows not sentiment are nothing but machines and they do not know the real glory of life," he added.
