### Horticultural Society

#### Will Give Premiums

### GRAIN VARIETY AND FERTILIZER TESTS

Grain variety and fertilizer demonstrations have been sown on the farms of Malcolm T. McNabb, Georgetown, and J. C. Bell of Freeman, states J. E. Whitecock, Agricultural Representative for Halton. Numerous inquiries are received by the local agricultural office with respect to the best variety of oat for this district. In order, therefore, to get more definite information from a local standpoint tests which include eight of the leading varieties of oats, and two of barley, namely, O.C. No. 2 and No. 3, a smooth awned variety, have been sown on the farms mentioned above. It is generally recognized that the fertility requirements differ widely on different soil types and also within the same type according to previous cropping history. At each point soil was analyzed in order to ascertain as accurately as possible, the soil requirements. These fields will be watched with interest by the farmers in the respective sections.
