HALTON CALF CLUBS ORGANIZE FOR 1938

Halton Calf Clubs which are sponsored by the County of Halton Agricultural Society, held their initial meeting on Friday evening last. Forty-four boys between the ages of 12 and 20 inclusive have already signed up and a number of other members are still anticipated. At the meeting held in Milton on Friday last, Dr. Branlon, head of the newly created Department of Animal Nutrition, at the Ontario Agricultural College, was the guest speaker. Dr. Branlon in his address pointed out that in many sections of older Ontario we are finding the soils are becoming depleted in certain essential minerals. The resulting crops are also deficient, stated Dr. Branlon, and in turn we find quite a percentage of our animals are suffering from mineral deficiency. In general the condition in our livestock can be corrected by supplementing our feeds with a mineral mixture of steamed bone meal or bone char and iodized salt.

transport board. The brief of the railway association presented to the committee says however that the regulation of air and water carriers is in the interest of the shipping public, the general public and the carriers themselves.

The Association also supports the "agreed charges" of the bill, which was opposed by the Canadian Manufacturers Association. The clause would allow a transport company to make special rates with a shipper if the shipper would agree to send all his goods by the one transport company. The Canadian manufacturers association said this would lead to discrimination and "chaotic" conditions. The railway association on the other hand claims it would give the railways and other forms of transport a fairer opportunity to compete with unregulated traffic. Agreed charges were used universally in water and truck traffic, the association argued.

The Senate Inquiry
The senate probe of the railway question will likely be a long and thorough affair. It began with an attempt to find out why the cooperative economy measures provided by the railway act of 1923 have resulted in such a small saving compared to what was promised. The saving has been not more than one tenth of what was expected and certain specific suggestions for the elimination of duplicating lines have not been carried out. The committee will hear full explanations of the unified management plan for the two railways, and any other approaches by railway experts to this perplexing problem.

The Budget
The Dominion budget seems some little distance off, naturally the finance minister would like to have the tariff provisions of the new trade treaty with the United States in this budget. Our ambassadors are hard at it in Washington, but no one can be quite sure when the negotiations will be completed. Aside from or as a part of the treaty will the budget have reductions in the farm implement duties? That is a question which is occupying the attention of Western members.

"The Ottawa Spotlight"

By Spectator
Ottawa, May 10th.—Railway matters are very much to the fore just now in the parliamentary forum. A committee of the commons is discussing Mr. Howe's transport bill and a committee of the senate has begun a general probe of the whole railway problem.

The New Transport Bill
In the committee of railways, canals and telegraphs of the commons, the railway association of Canada has given its endorsement to the administration's transport bill which would create a transport board and would bring control of air traffic and inland

water traffic (with the exception of bulk commodities) under the authority of this board. The Board of Transport Commissioners would be the Board of Railway Commissioners with increased jurisdiction. The railway association's approval of the bill which means the approval of the railways themselves is given because the provisions of the bill "would create a more balanced economy in transportation." The point is that only railways have hitherto been regulated. A difficulty with the transport question in Canada is that trucking, except where the traffic crosses inter-provincial or international boundaries is not under Dominion jurisdiction. Trucking is left entirely out of the sphere of duty of the new
