Although the number of automobile license plates manufactured at the Ontario Reformatory this year was greater than any previous year, more will be made next year. An order for an additional 17,000 markers has been placed for 1938. Dr. J. D. Henslip, superintendent, announced. Reformatory officials are unable to give an estimate of the number of plates manufactured this year.

Motor accidents throughout Ontario show an increase of 44 in the first three months of 1938, as compared with 1937. Fatalities decreased 13 and 117 fewer persons were injured. Accidents, reported to the provincial highways department, total 2,490, against 2,446 a year ago. Deaths numbered 101, and injuries 1,838. Although the accident total shows an increase the ratio in proportion to motor cars is lower. Passenger car registration during the first three

months of the year show an increase of 11.8 per cent. over 1937.

WORK TO START ON OAKVILLE'S POST OFFICE THIS MONTH

Work on Oakville's much-mooted new post office, which has been hanging fire for the past year, will positively begin some time this month, according to W. N. Robinson, R.O., prominent Oakville Liberal. Plans for the building have been prepared and the necessary permit issued by the town, said Mr. Robinson, although tenders have not yet been called for. This, however, would be done, very soon, he stated. An effort was being made to secure an additional grant in the federal government's supplementary estimates. Mr. Robinson explained. The original grant was for \$30,000, of which \$5,500 was expended for a building site.

The new post office will be built on land next to the Red Indian service station at the southwest corner of Colborne and George streets, roughly opposite the present post office.

TENT CATERPILLARS. Now is the time to control tent caterpillars. The whitish webs constructed by the insects are only too commonly seen on neglected fruit trees, and on roadside trees, especially wild cherries. The caterpillars may be readily killed by spraying infested trees with lead arsenate 2 pounds in 40 gallons, or by destroying the tents by hand when the caterpillars are inside them, which is usually on cloudy days and early in the morning. Burning the nests with a torch is very effective, but care must be taken not to burn the tree. It is possible to destroy these tents early and thus save labor and loss of fruit later.
