ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION TO REV. MR. McMILLAN

A delightful social evening was spent last Tuesday, June 7th, at the home of Andrew McDonald in honour of Rev. Norman McMillan who has resigned the pastorate of Union and Norval Presbyterian Churches.

In the course of the evening Mr. McMillan was presented with a Lorie wrist watch by the Union congregation. Mrs. G. H. Leslie read the following address:

Dear Mr. McMillan:

"We, the congregation of Union, have learned with regret of your intention of severing your connection with our church. During the three years you have been here, you have made many friends by the sincere fulfilment of your duties and your pleasing personality. Your capability as a minister will make it difficult for another to take your place.

To see and know a young man who has taken for his life work the teaching of God's word will ever be an inspiration to the young people. Your relation with the older people of the church has shown friendship and sympathetic understanding.

We ask you to accept this gift as a remembrance of your many friends and as a recognition of the fact that we have valued your services. We trust that you may have shared to continue in His service as an active worker in the extension of God's kingdom and that your efforts may be richly blessed."
