COMMITTED FOR ROBBERY

George Kelly of North Bay, and Vernon Slater of Vancouver were committed for trial by Magistrate Woodliffe in a preliminary hearing at Georgetown on Monday. Accused were charged with robbing Georgetown Creamery, Morris Saxe, owner of the Georgetown Creamery, testified that his building had been broken into in the early morning of May 28 and a large quantity of cigarettes and tobacco had been stolen.
