**JAMES M. BOVAIRD**  
James Marshall Bovaird died at Brampton on Thursday, June 16th. He was nationally known as a horse breeder, twice being president of the Shire Breeders' Association of Canada. He was a director of the Canadian Thoroughbred Horse Society and for many years a director of the Peel County Agricultural Society. He was born in Ireland and in 1883 was married to Fanny Ward. Mr. Bovaird was a Liberal in politics and was a member of the Church of England. He and his wife had been residents of their farm near Brampton since their marriage. He is survived by his widow, six daughters and five sons. They are: Dr. James, London; John David, Robert and William, of Brampton; and Mrs. Charles Gault, Brampton; Mrs. John Stanfield, Islington; Mrs. Edward Dodds, Inglewood; Miss Frances, Burnhamthorpe; Miss Gilda, Toronto, and Mrs. Jas. Morris, Brampton.
