### HORNBY VILLAGE 120 YEARS OLD

The tiny village of Hornby, the site of Canada's most powerful radio transmitter, was 120 years old on June 30th.

In June, 1818, five men, who with their families, had left the British Isles in search of a new home, landed in the District of York. They were John Dempsey and John Fisher, natives of Scotland, and Abraham Nelson, Thomas Joyce and John Wilson from Ireland. After spending some time in preparation, the little band left York for their new home. They travelled by stage coach along the Dundas highway as far as Munn's Corners, and then started on foot up the sixth line, then only a blasted trail through a wilderness of oak and pine, until they reached the baseline between Trafalgar and Essex townships.

Under two tall elm trees on what is now the Chisholm farm, the exhausted travellers rested on the night of June 20th, 1818.

## Council Engage Surveyors to Report on Sewage Disposal Plant

### Reeve George Davis Acts in Mayor Gibbon's Absence—Firemen Given Convention Grant—\$689.85 Placed in Housing Commission Sinking Fund.

Council met on Tuesday evening in the Waterworks Building. Members present: Reeve Davis, Councillors Cripps, Brown, Hall, Costigan, Lyons, and Smith.

In the absence of Mayor Gibbons at the Hydro Electric Convention at Blackton, Reeve Davis was elected to the chair.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Charles Burnside complained to Council about grass fires destroying shade trees on the street near his residence.

Mr. A. Speight and Mr. Fred Sinclair, on behalf of the Halton Garage Operators' Association, asked for permission to use certain streets or parts of the highway for their safety lane campaign on August 10th.

Communications were read from: Ralph Ross, secretary Horticultural Society; John McDermid, secretary Public Library Board; Hospital for Sick Children, Hagey, Gray and Plunkett Limited, James Proctor and Rodfern, Wynne Robertson and McLean, Housing Commission, C. C. Cornell, Toronto General Hospital.

Moved by Brown, seconded by Costigan, that the Firemen be given the usual grant of \$50.00 to pay expenses of delegates to the Firemen's Convention at Barrie.—Carried.

Moved by Lyons, seconded by Smith that the Treasurer pay the Relief Commission the sum of \$139.80 to pay June accounts.—Carried.

Moved by Costigan, seconded by Smith that the amount of \$689.85 received in full payment for a Housing Commission house be placed in a sinking fund and applied on Housing debentures, and that a by-law be prepared to authorize such payment.—Carried.

Moved by Hall, seconded by Cripps that the firm of Hagey, Gray and Plunkett Limited be engaged to make a survey and report on a sewage system and disposal plant for the Town of Georgetown.—Carried.

Moved by Brown, seconded by Costigan, that the Council agree to cooperate with the Halton County Garage Operators' Association in providing a street or part of the highway for a safety lane campaign on August 10th, subject to the approval of the Highway Department.—Carried.

A number of accounts were passed.
