Holiday Precautions

The annual summer holiday is designed to improve the health of you and your children. Care should be taken that proper benefit of this holiday is gained and that its benefit is not impaired by accident or preventable disease. The following precautions are eminently worth while:-

1. Be sure that the water supply is safe. If you are not satisfied with Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Kelly and family the character of this supply, boll the water. Cool and aerate it by pouring the water from one jug to another. Also ask the Provincial Health Department for information as to a practical method of purifying water. Some provinces furnish a simple apparatus for this purpose at cost. An additional precaution is the use of anti-typhoid vaccine which also supplied by the Heatlh Department. 2. Do not take unnecessary risks when swimming. Learn the simplicity of the Schafer method of artificial respiration and teach your lads how to practice it on one another. .3. Take a small first-aid kit with you. There will always be burns,

bites and scratches to be dressed. 4. If you are camping out, extinguish all fires before you leave camp. 5.
