With the heavy crops reported from most grain growing countries of the Northern hemisphere, there is uncertainty about future wheat prices. Canada will have pretty strong competition during the autumn and early winter months from the United States, the Danubian countries and possibly from Russia, while later Argentina and Australia will enter the market. There are certain factors however favorable to Canada in world markets. There are the quality and grading of this country's wheat. The bulk work on himself if he ever hopes for of the best spring wheat as well as a cure. the best hard Kansan winter wheat in the United States is used by domestic millers. The percentage of the higher grades available for export is smaller than in Canada. Russian wheat is sold by samples and shipments are not so uniform as shipments from Canada. However excess of supply compared with import requirements is a bearish influence on the market which Canada as an exporting country must feel.


