MRS. WM. THOMPSON

Georgetown lost another highly esteemed resident in the person of Mrs. Wm. Thompson, who passed away on Friday last, August 12th. Mrs. Thompson, who was formerly Jennie Willis, was born in Lucknow, Ontario, seventy-eight years ago, but had spent some fifty-eight years of her life in Georgetown. Mrs. Thompson's husband, the late Wm. Thompson, predeceased her eight years ago. Deceased was of a retiring nature, beloved in her home and by all who knew her. Surviving are three daughters, and four sons, Mrs. D. P. Crichton, Georgetown, Mrs. Russell Salmon, Bracebridge, Mrs. H. L. Wheatley, Port Stanley; Wallace, Garnet and Ray Thompson, Georgetown, and Herbert of Windsor. The funeral was held from her home on King street to St. George's Church on Sunday afternoon, where a service was conducted by her former pastor, Rev. F. H. Wase of Guelf, in the absence of Rev. W. G. O. Thompson. The pall-bearers were Messrs. B. Bradley, Jack and Ray Crichton, Frank Jack and Duncan Toet. Interment was made in Glen Williams cemetery. There were many beautiful floral tributes from relatives and friends.

No Action at Present On Erin Township Audit

Council Not Sure Audit's Heavy Expense Warranted

Action has been deferred upon the petition of 59 taxpayers of Erin Township that an audit of township accounts for transactions of the past six years, until the township council is assured that the expenditure entailed in such an audit would be justified. Reeve John McFee of Hillsburg said. The cost of an audit would be in the neighborhood of \$3,000, it was estimated and an expenditure of that size would have a marked effect on the tax rate of the township. Reeve McFee, who also holds the wardenship of Wellington County, indicated that his council wished to arrive at a solution of the problem presented by the petition as inexpensively as possible. The councillors, he said, had decided to table the petition, which was presented by R. C. Barbour, until legal advice on the question had been obtained from R. C. Done, Guelf, solicitor for the municipality. The situation has assumed serious complications from the fact that Mr. Barbour was a brother-in-law of the man who had been tax-collector for the township for four years, and who has been released from office, when a deficit of \$2,800 in the accounts had been discovered. Council, when the deficit was shown in January, 1936, refused to take legal action, under the circumstances, but arrived at a settlement of the affair with the assistance of the bonding company. Daniel Gray, Treasurer of Erin Township for the past 16 years, stated that he was heartily in accord with the projected audit, but that, as an employee of the township, he could not take any definite steps to encourage the institution of such an investigation, by reason of the cost involved. He had no fault to find with the work of G. C. Burt, former resident of the township, and B. R. McConnell, merchant, as auditors for the township, but pointed out that when the special audit of the tax rolls had been instituted to sum up the deficit in the accounts at his suggestion, the two township auditors had been obliged to do \$300 worth of work before the accounts could be considered balanced. In the event that a firm of chartered accountants was engaged to do the work, Mr. Gray believed that the charges would amount to \$3,000. No stipulation was made in the petition, Reeve McFee stated, as to whether chartered accountants should be employed to conduct the audit, but the words "properly qualified auditors" were used. As far as he knew, Mr. McFee added, the township's records are in proper condition at the present time, and the council would not move to have an audit unless it was convinced that the audit would be of some value to the township as a whole.

The orange is one of our year-round fruits. When the Navel, or winter orange begins to disappear from the market, the Valencia or summer orange takes its place. The Valencia, or summer orange, is supposed to have originated in the Azores. Under California climatic conditions this fruit ripens from April to November and supplies millions of homes with their summer fruit punches and morning orange juice.

Few foods are as valuable in the diet as the orange. It has a decided alkaline reaction when taken into the system and thus tends to counteract the acid reaction of many common and healthful foods. Furthermore, the orange is rich in Vitamins A, B and C.

With hot weather upon us, you may be interested in the fact that recent experiments have shown that exposure to high temperature will cause as much as a fifty per cent loss in Vitamin C from the body tissues. As lowered Vitamin C reserves go hand-in-hand with the tired feeling we get when the weather is sizzling hot, the following recipes are suggested as beverages that are more than delicious hot weather drinks:

Hollywood Parade (Serves 30)
1 quart orange juice
1 quart orange sherbet
1 quart vanilla ice cream
1 quart chilled ginger ale
Beat orange juice, sherbet and ice cream with whirl type beater until well mixed. Add ginger ale. Stir and serve at once.

Patio Cooler
2 cups boiling water
8 teaspoons jasmine tea
1 1/2 cups sugar
5 cups orange juice
1 cup lemon juice
2 quarts of ice water, ginger ale or charged water
1 quart orange sherbet
Orange slices for garnish
Pour boiling water over tea. Steep 5 minutes. Strain and dissolve sugar in warm liquid. Cool. Add chilled fruit juices. Just before serving, add ice water or carbonated beverage. Garnish with orange slices. Float sherbet on top. (Makes 1 gallon—fills an ordinary punch bowl—30 small punch glass servings.)
