## **SURPRISING FACTS** ABOUT by Betty Barcley.

Now that the warm weather is bringing teed tea back into popularity, I decided to ask an expert just what tea is. I learned some surprising facts.

"All tea-black, green and colong -is the same on the bosh," said my expert, Robert A. Lewis, the specialist who is a member of the United States Tea Board. "Grocers' before the tea is manufac-

"Most people", said Mr. Lewis, "know that there are green teas and black toss, but they think of them, botanically, as entirely different species of the tea plant. This is not the case, for the tea plant, wherever it grows, is the same. Green tes and black tes may be produced at will from the same bush, and are merely the result of manipulation in manufacture. Irrespective of the country of production, all leaves when plucked from the bush are green. The difference in tea leaves on any one bush is that some are tender and some are tough. Naturally, tender leaf ten has better quality.

"Green ten is a product largely of Japan. Immediately after pickfor the green leaves are steamed to soal the pores and set the natural green color. The leaves are then dried over charcoal fires, curied and prepared for shipping. Because of the lightness of the color of green tes, many people think it is impossible to make it strong. However, the strength has little to são with the color, for green ten may be made to any required strongth.

"Sodia, Java and Osylon supply black tea. It differs from green tea. only in the process it goes through after picking. The leaves are taken to the ten factory, withered and rolled. They are then ferposted, and it is this process which gives the tea its dark or

# United Church Pays Pensions to 1,581 Pasters and Kin

PAID TOTAL OF \$747,363 DURING 1937 IN BENEFITS

Ministers Get \$463,738; Widows \$244,-099; Orphans \$10,040 MortaRty Costs \$3,400.

More than 600 aged and wormout ministers of The United Church of Canada receive benefits from the Pension Fund of The United Church, according to a report to be presented next month to the General Council by Rev. S. W. Dean, secretary of the Fund. His report reveals that widows of ministers and 127 orphans also receive benefits from the Pension Fund. Approximately one half of the ministers receiving benefits have been either home or foreign mission-

Brice. More than 2500 ministers and missionaries of The United Church of Canada are paying into the Pension Fund, the report shows. In addition to these, there are 300 to 400 who will some day be entitled to limited benefits, notwithstanding they are noncontributors. This is provided in part by the ministers' or missionaries' personal payments and in part by the payments of the congregations.

#### CANNING FRUITS FOR EXHIBITION

Prize winning canned fruits are those which have the most natural colour, flavour and appearance. The usual canning methods result in fruits which have lost some of their original colour and in shrivelling or shrinkage, the jars consequently being incompletely filled. In order to preserve the fruit with its natural colour, flavour and form, the sterilizing treatment should be just sufficient to effect sterllity without cooking the product, states R. W. ### **MIGRATORY BIRDS** CONVENTION ACT

Ottawa Issues Regulations That Will be in Ferce in the Prevince For Current Year.

The National Parks Service of the Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa, has just issued the Regulations regarding Migratory Birds for the current year. A summary of the Regulations as they apply to Ontario
