ROBERT JAMES MAXWELL

After an illness of six weeks, the death occurred in St. Michael's Hospital Thursday, Sept. 1st, of Robert James Maxwell, aged 62, of 39 Raglan Ave., Toronto. Born in Inghill, County Antrim, Northern Ireland, he came to Canada in 1899 and joined the sales staff of Dresses Ltd., and was later employed by the T. Eaton Co. Mr. Maxwell was a member of the Independent Order of the Commercial Travellers' Association and a member of St. Clair Avenue United Church. His wife, Florence Acres Maxwell, died some years ago. He is survived by one son, Stewart R. Maxwell; one sister, Margaret B. Maxwell, and two brothers, William and Arthur, all of Toronto. Funeral services were held at Miles Funeral Chapel, St. Clair Avenue West, Saturday afternoon, with interment in St. John's Norway cemetery. Rev. Dr. J. E. Todd, of St. Clair United Church, officiated.

J. E. K. CUTTS

At the advanced age of 91 years, J. E. K. Cutts passed away on Sunday, August 21st, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. Vansoezen. Born in Nottingham, England, in 1847, he was the eldest son and last surviving member of the family of Rev. E. L. Cutts, D.D. Educated at Merchant Taylors' School in London, and Felsford College, Essex, he later studied architecture, under Mr. Christian, and was made an F.R.I.B.A. (Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects). During his life work as an architect he designed over forty churches as well as other buildings and homes. In 1912 he came to Canada and bought a farm at Terra Cotta, which was operated for him by his son, Charles. In 1882 he was joined in holy wedlock to Miss Emma Peacock, who predeceased him in 1916. Five children remain to revere the memory of a beloved father: W. Frank Cutts, Esq., date; Mrs. F. Minto; T. G. Cutts; Mrs. W. Rutledge, Terra Cotta; Chas. E. Cutts, Acton; and Mrs. C. S. Vansoezen, Acton. Two other children died within a week of each other, over forty years ago. To all who have been bereaved sympathy of many friends goes out at this time. In spite of his years, Mr. Cutts was quite active and took a keen interest in everything. He had made quite a collection of pioneer articles and last year was one of the largest and most enthusiastic exhibitors in the historical section at Acton Fair. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon, with service conducted in St. Alban's Church, Acton, by Rev. A. E. Brooks. The pall-bearers were six grandsons, Jack, Dick and Donald Vansoezen, Edward Rutledge, Allan and Stanley Cutts. Interment was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Rev. Mr. Banks, of Erindale, conducted the service at the graveside. Among the floral tributes were those from the family of the grandchildren, the McCleary family, Mrs. W. Noble, Mr. and Mrs. G. Mason, and Mrs. A. H. Bishop—Free Press.

Everyone has read of advertisements which, to say the least, hardly express the advertiser's meaning, such as that old chestnut, "Do not go elsewhere to be cheated, Come to us."

A writer in the Yorkshire Post has collected a number of new ones, alleged to be genuine. The other day, he says, he passed an eating-house of the cheaper variety. In the window appeared an announcement, printed in large red letters:

"Dine here once! You will never dine anywhere else!"

An advertisement appeared in a local paper, he says, reading:

"Try our butter; nobody else can touch it. Who would want to try after reading that, he asks. Nor does he think thrifty shoppers would be attracted by a line in a circular issued by a firm of Leeds haberdashers, which says: "We are running a sale of men's shirts which will only last for one week."

CHINESE BOY SCOUT AND GIRL GUIDE WAR HEROES

Of 16 Chinese Boy Scouts and Girl Guides of Singapore who enlisted for first-aid and hospital work in the Chinese war zone but one remains, according to a Weekly News Bulletin story from London Scout Headquarters. The survivor is Ng Chee Keng, a lad of 19, now living in a Hankow hospital—recovering from bullet wounds and a fractured skull.

Ten of his companions have been killed, two badly wounded and the remaining four reported missing. His only remaining friend is Miss Ching Yeng Tack, social secretary of the unit known as the Singapore Chinese War Front Service Corps, who had her right leg amputated as a result of a severe machine-gun wound while serving in a first-aid field station on the Shanai front.

In the party of young heroes were nine boys and seven girls, all in their teens, mostly students in Singapore. They represented the cream of the overseas Chinese Scouts and Guides in Malaya. Most of them came from families of high standing. They were led by a capable girl, Miss Mack Swee Cheng, the only daughter of a wealthy Chinese sugar merchant in Singapore.

Besides rescuing the wounded and giving first-aid, the boys were used as dispatch runners under the constant dangers of the battlefield. They forgot their own safety "when things of greater importance" were to be performed.

The evacuation of the Chinese troops from Shanghai found three of their comrades dead, including a girl. One Scout was killed by a stray bullet while carrying a message. The other Scout died when a Red Cross truck, carrying wounded to a field station, was bombed, and death came to the Girl Guide, Chee Kong Tee, during an air raid, while she was directing the evacuation of war refugees around Lotien.

Joseph Chitty, the famous English judge, was one day listening to a particularly uninteresting case. It dealt with household goods and agricultural implements.
