ONTARIO BUSINESS SUMMARY

While optimism is felt regarding autumn trade, wholesale buying during August was confined to the maintenance of the modest stocks in the hands of retailers. Retail trade in urban centres experienced a steady demand for strictly seasonal goods, and generally rural sales compared favourably with those of a year ago. Collections are fair. It is estimated that the tourist traffic was below that of last year and spending was more conservative. Industrial activity has been stimulated by the satisfactory Western Canada grain crop and the prospects of an early commencement of airplane construction on an important scale. Tool, die and pattern makers have substantial orders on hand, and the immediate outlook is favourable. Automobile manufacturers are about to begin production of new models, and accessory plants are actively engaged. Agricultural implement factories are seasonally quiet. Textile, woollen and worsted, and knitting mills are operating on slightly increased schedules. The improvement in the tanning industry has been maintained. Shoe factories are well engaged and the volume of orders is satisfactory. Lumber prices are holding fairly steady but markets remain inactive. Furniture manufacturers report a slight improvement over the previous month. Gold production for July totaled 253,222 ounces (\$8,963,120), as compared with 214,663 ounces (\$7,513,205) in July, 1937. Production of silver was 34,264 ounces, against 33,375 ounces a year ago.

Fire Prevention Week

From Oct. 24th to 31st this year has been chosen as "Fire Prevention Week" to impress upon the citizens the national importance of safeguarding life and property from loss by fire.
 Government figures show that during the last 17 years 127,000 fires in Canada destroyed insurable property valued at more than \$675,000,000 and that 7,200 persons lost their lives and more than 22,000 were seriously injured as the result of fire, the proclamation claims. At least 80 per cent. of the fires which occur originate through ignorance or neglect and the exercise of reasonable prudence and proper carefulness would substantially reduce the losses by fire.
 The proclamation fixing the date urges that dwellings and other buildings be inspected and cleaned of rubbish in order to reduce fire hazards and maintain health and safety. Fire drills are recommended for stores, institutions, large stores and factories. Boy Scout leaders are asked to give instruction to the troops under their control as to the best means of co-operation with municipal fire departments in preventing fires.
 All legislation and regulations enacted or issued by the Dominion, provincial or municipal authorities dealing with fire prevention should be given publicity by the municipal officials, in co-operation to reduce fire hazards.

HOW TO AVOID THE POOR HOUSE

We haven't the time to do it, but no doubt many of our readers are capable of taking pencil and paper and figure this out for themselves.
 The story goes like this: Let a young man or woman start in at the age of twenty years and put away twenty dollars at interest, instead of buying cigarettes, for instance. Most boys and some girls spend that much on "fags" in the course of a year. But if you don't smoke then probably you have another habit such as chocolate bars or chewing gum. In any event put away twenty dollars a year or a little over \$c a day.
 Do this every year and let the interest stay there too for fifty years and when you reach the ripe young age of seventy you will be able to laugh at the poorhouse. You will have to your credit by that time the tidy sum of twenty thousand dollars. We just print the above to show you that even five cents a day systematically saved, will produce results. HORSESHOEING COMPETITIONS AT INTERNATIONAL PLOWING MATCH

It is a serious situation from a farming standpoint and fully realized by the Ontario Plowmen's Association.
 The crown of Canadian and Ontario plowmen will be competing for the highest plowing honors in the world at the International Match at Minesing, near Barrie, October 11, 12, 13 and 14 this year, so why not have horseshoeing competitions for the farmers' friend, the blacksmith, reasoned officials of the Ontario Plowmen's Association. With this thought in mind, competitions for mature and junior blacksmiths will be held each day at 2 p.m. during the match. Prize lists and rules may be obtained by writing to Bert Guest, Ontario, chairman of this committee, or to J. A. Carroll, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.
 Mr. Carroll, secretary of the International, is most enthusiastic over the horseshoeing contests. "We will always have good horses, and care must be taken of their feet," said Mr. Carroll. "We will either have to have more blacksmith apprentices or young farmers must learn to shoe their own horses. We hope by introducing these horseshoeing competitions to revive interest in what is fast becoming a lost art."
 "These competitions have been held in the Old Country for years and have been most successful. I feel they will be a most attractive feature of the match at Minesing," concluded Mr. Carroll.
