The community was indeed shocked this week by the sudden death of Mrs. Frank McIntosh, at the home on John Street, on Monday. Although Mrs. McIntosh has not enjoyed robust health for some time, she was about her household duties as usual until Saturday morning, when she suffered a heart seizure. She failed to rally and passed away on Monday. Mrs. McIntosh was, before her marriage, Miss Maude Mason, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Mason. Although born at Lisgar, she had spent the most of her life in Acton, coming here with her parents in childhood. She was a kindly neighbor and a real home-maker. She will be missed not only by her husband and sister and brothers, but by many who had cherished her friendship and cheerful disposition. She was a member of the United Church, regular in attendance at its services, and enjoyed greatly its fellowship. The family pew in this church will indeed feel a vacancy. Friends from all sections of the community, that has been her home for so many years, as well as others more distant, join in sympathy with the bereft husband, the only remaining sister, Miss Lottie, and her brothers, Messrs. Bert, Amos and Charles, all residents of Acton. The funeral was held Friday afternoon, when friends gathered to pay tribute to her life. The service was conducted by her pastor Rev. E. M. Morrow. 1939 Car Markers will be More Legible

The question of license plate visibility, subject to so many gusty storms of controversy in 1938, appears to have been ushered right out of the picture for next year at least judging by a preview of the 1939 motor vehicle markers given by the Department of Highways.

The artistic has given way completely to the utilitarian in Ontario's selection of a color scheme for next year's markers, with white serial numbers on jet black background replacing the current pale blue and pale rose combination. And yet in many respects the new plates are more artistic than any combination of more delicate hues in the past. They are certainly more legible.
