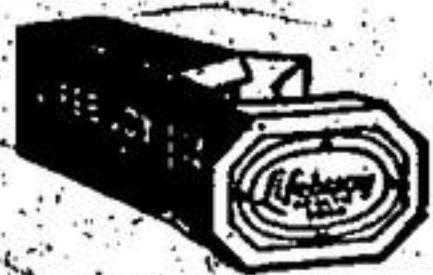

Sugar beet and celery harvests have been under way in Lambton. Lincoln County reports that every farm has more than enough ensilage to fill his silo, the first time in many years that this has been the case. Potato-harvesting is general in Middlesex, with yields varying from 100 to 300 bushels per acre and quality good. Hastings reports that livestock is in good shape there and milk flow is holding up well for the time of year. Northumberland makes a similar report. Victoria states that the yield of grain
