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Transients to be Put on Farms Under Direction of A. Maclaren

Queen's Park Decides on Project to Care for Single Jobless Under Youth Training Plan - Men to be Placed in Order of Registration.

Unemployed single men who have no domicile, and are therefore unable to claim relief through regular channels, will be absorbed on Ontario farms under the provisions of the Dominion-Provincial youth training agreement, Hon. Eric Cross, minister of welfare, announced yesterday, following conferences with Premier Hepburn and Labor Minister N. O. Hipel. The project will be organized and

directed by A. Maclaren of Georgetown, who placed more than 4,000 young men on farms under similar circumstances from 1928 to 1935, when he was superintendent of the Norval Hostel and Glenbrae Farm, Georgetown. Mr. Maclaren has been visiting rural districts for the past week, making arrangements for the placing of men, the minister said

Only unemployed transients now in Toronto will benefit by the scheme at present, Mr. Cross announced, but if the measure is successful it will likely be applied in other sections of the

The minister said the program would involve young men from 16 to 30 years of age and would be carried out entirely under the Department of Labor.

Wages under the scheme will range from \$120 to \$200 a year, plus board and lodgings, with the scale set at \$10 a month until March 31, 1939, and from \$10 to \$20 per month thereafter, depending on the ability of each man. Registration of the men will be be-
