### CHARLES N. RYAN

Enroute to his home in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Charles N. Ryan died at sea on October 19th, 1938. The late Mr. Ryan was born in Georgetown and always retained a deep interest in the affairs of his home town. He began work with the Toronto Street Railway Company, later going to Sao Paulo for the Mackenzie Company, and from there to Rio de Janeiro, where he rose to be comptroller of the Tramway, Light and Power Company. Mr. Ryan had been in poor health for about a year, and came to Toronto in July hoping to benefit by the change. Believing that it would be wise to sail for the south before the cold weather, Mr. and Mrs. Ryan sailed from New York on Oct. 15, and a cable on the following Tuesday announced the sad news of his passing. Mr. Ryan is survived by his widow, one daughter, Kathleen and three sons, Dalton, Ross and Glen, also by his two sisters, Jessie and Annie Ryan of Georgetown.

### JAMES BOYLE

Death came suddenly after a few days illness to Mr. James W. Boyle at Watertown, N.Y., on Friday, Mr. Boyle left Ireland with his wife and daughter Mary 43 years ago and settled in Scotland where he was well-known as a color mixer in coating mills. He later moved to England and came to Canada 18 years ago where he was employed by Ritchie & Ramsay Co. for 19 years. Since then he has been employed in Georgetown, Franklin, Ohio; Brooklyn and Watertown, N.Y. He was predeceased by his wife eleven months ago, a daughter Mrs. Muir of Georgetown six months ago, and another daughter, Mrs. Connelly four years ago. He leaves to mourn Mrs. Gillivet, James, John and Kay Boyle, Georgetown; Charlie and Mrs. J. Stowart of New Toronto; Mrs. P. McCarthy of Franklin, Ohio, and grand children. The funeral took place at New Toronto on Monday when Requiem High Mass was held at St. Teresa Church, and interment took place in St. Mary's Cemetery, Port Credit. There were many beautiful floral tributes and mass cards from employees Taggart Bros., Alliance Coating Mills, and friends in New Toronto and Georgetown.
