THIS AND THAT IN SPORT.

HOCKEY BLUE LINES WIDER

Because the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association agreed on the alterations, every rink in the country will have to make its blue lines one foot wide and paint the goal posts and all lines, except zone lines, red. The wider blue lines and one other item are designed to cut down on off-side plays. A player will not be considered offside unless his skates are over the blue line edge nearest the goal. That means he may reach over the line with his stick for the puck so long as his skates don't cross before he touches the rubber.

A minor penalty will be imposed on any player except the goaltender who holds the puck against the boards unless he is being checked by another player. A penalty shot will be awarded if the goalie holds the puck more than three seconds, drops it into his pads or tosses it into the crowd. These things formerly called a painful whistle blast and a face-off. Now they come under the head of "stalling" and should occur less often.

An offside will be called when the defending team uses the puck from its own end, the rubber crosses the penalty shot line in the other team's area; formerly the puck had only to cross the far blue line to be called "iced." The referee, however, will not call the play until he is sure a goal cannot be scored on an iced shot.



BOXING SHOW ASSURED OF SUCCESS

To climax a perfect fight card, a fight to the finish will be staged by "The Terror of the Fruit Markets," Dick Licata and "The Fighting Underdog," H. C. McCure. This novelty attraction will no doubt be well worth the price of admission in itself. Baby Yack will be the official referee, and many outstanding celebrities in the world of sport will be present.

It will be a great night for the sporting public of Georgetown.

Other ring celebrities you will meet at the show will be Frankie Genaro, the former flyweight champion of the world, Charlie Ring, the prominent Toronto sportsman who until lately has spent much effort in promoting charity boxing shows for Lions Clubs, such as the boxing tournament held in Georgetown a few years ago.

Steve Rocco, Baby Yack's trainer, and former flyweight and bantamweight champ himself, will be here with his protégé "Stuffer" who will long be remembered for his famous battles with Frenchy Belanger for the world title, in which he lost once, drew once, and won once.
