

**Armistice Day Suggestions**

Here are a few tips that will help you make your Armistice Day meals memorable:

**Orange Walnut Cheese Salad**  
(Serves 4)

This salad combines translucent orange slices and segments with novel and flavorful walnut cheese bonbons:

- 5 or 6 oranges
- 24 halves of walnut kernels
- 1 small package (3 oz. size) cream cheese

Peel oranges, removing skin and inner membrane down to juicy meat. Cut one orange in slices. Cut out segments free from membrane for remaining oranges. On lettuce-covered salad plate center a large slice of orange. Arrange 3 groups of orange segments (3 segments to a group) around this orange slice. Moisten cheese with a little orange juice, shape into balls and press walnut halves into two sides. Place one of these walnut cheese bonbons between each group of orange segments. Garnish orange slices with strips of pimento. Serve with any desired dressing.

**Butterscotch Parfait**

1 package butterscotch arrowroot pudding

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup water
- 4 egg whites
- 1/2 cup cream, whipped

Mix butterscotch arrowroot pudding with sugar and water; bring to boil, stirring constantly. Beat egg whites until stiff. Pour hot pudding mixture slowly over egg whites, beating continually. Cool and fold in whipped cream. Freeze in refrigerator tray about 4 hours. Makes about 1 quart.

**Succotash**

- 1 cup cooked, dried Lima
- 2 cups corn, fresh or canned
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/2 cup cream

Combine ingredients and heat in a double boiler over hot water.

**THE SACREDNESS OF HUMAN LIFE**

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson, November 13th, 1938

**GOLDEN TEXT:** "Thou shalt not kill." Exodus 20: 13. "Whoever hateth his brother is a murderer." 1 John 3: 15.

**Armistice Day**

It is appropriate that we should think of the sacredness of human life during the annual commemoration of Armistice Day. In the World War there were approximately ten million deaths in battle, twenty million wounded, nine million war orphans, five million war widows, ten million refugees. No sane person individually would ever wish such disaster upon others. But collectively the nations allowed it to happen. Moses, who gave the commandment, "Thou shalt not kill," ordered the slaughter of several thousand people. The Christian conscience still requires education as to the sacredness of human life. Throughout the past year there has been war in Spain and in China, and in the month of September another European war was narrowly averted. Life is sacred because it cannot be replaced. In studying the sixth commandment we cannot forget that the crucifixion of Christ was a judicial murder.

**Infant Mortality**

It has been demonstrated that by educational methods and scientific care infant mortality may be reduced. Certain diseases have been practically conquered in civilized countries. Hundreds of thousands of tourists from all over the world have gone to an Ontario village to see the quintuplets whose lives have been preserved by medical care. The world may have lost great inventors, musicians, and statesmen through unnecessary deaths from contagious diseases afflicting childhood. It is the responsibility of the state, the Church, the medical and nursing professions to safeguard human life. The amount of discussion given to the question of race suicide has been out of proportion to the importance of the immediate practical problem of reducing infant mortality.

**Highway Slaughter**

Nearly fifty thousand lives are lost annually on the highways of North America, as many in one year as the total Canadian casualties during four years of war. This continuing tragedy is due partly to carelessness, to the mania for speed, and to the use of alcohol. The President of a large Casualty Company reports that serious losses experienced under automobile liability policies during the calendar year 1934, the first year after the repeal of prohibition in the United States. There were accidents involving deaths and serious personal injuries far in excess of previous years. Analysis of the cases disclosed "an abnormal percentage attributable to over-indulgence in alcoholic beverages by automobile operators, both young and old. I regard the greatest enemy to safe highway traffic to be the automobile driver who operates while in the glow of cocktails and other strong drinks. Eliminate this atrocious custom and much will have been accomplished for the safety of all." Governments are spending millions im-

proving highways, motor manufacturers are doing their utmost to make cars dependable, drivers are put through a severe test before being granted a driver's license, insurance companies are conducting campaigns of education to reduce the number of accidents, yet every day of legal sale thousands of motor cars are parked outside places where beverage alcohol is sold while the drivers make themselves less capable of safe driving.

**Unemployment**

The direct application of the sixth commandment is obvious in the discussion of such questions as lynching, capital punishment and racial purges. It is not so self-evident in relation to unemployment. Yet the sufferers from a decade of depression have had their lives endangered from undernourishment, disease, and the temptation to engage in hazardous employment. The number of suicides has become abnormally high. Many young people have had to postpone marriage and the birthrate has declined. Thousands have been tempted into crime. An American writer makes the statement that there are more deaths from violent teaching and racial purges, per thousand of population than in any other country which considers itself civilized.

**War**

The world is spending about sixteen billion dollars annually upon armaments. One battleship costs twenty million dollars. Would it not be more scientific social engineering to invest the money now being spent on armaments in safeguarding human life rather than in making preparations to destroy human life? The son of a dictator wrote a book describing his glee in dropping bombs upon the helpless natives in Ethiopian villages. Japanese bombers have killed Chinese women and children by the thousands attacking them from the air. The Christian Church is torn asunder in regard to war. The Sermon on the Mount teaches non-resistance. The death of Jesus Christ upon Calvary shows that he lived out his own teachings. We are at present living at a crisis level. There is no time to be lost discussing abstract questions. The duty of Christians is to be constructive workers for peace. The Christian Church can convince the world that the way of reason, arbitration and cooperation is practical. The Christian Church will have difficulty in justifying its continued existence if it cannot exercise the war demon from the modern world.
