**Plan Short Courses for 3,000 Boys and Girls in Rural Ontario**

Ontario Department of Agriculture Announces Dates for Five Three-Month and 32 One-Month Courses—Only Entrance Requirement is Willingness to Learn.

It won't be the fault of the Ontario Department of Agriculture if the boys and girls of rural Ontario are not trained to meet the changing farm and household conditions of the province. Hon. P. M. Dewar, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, in addressing rural young people from one end of the province to the other, has continually stressed the point that the young people of today are the farmers and the farmers' wives of to-morrow. If they are to compete successfully with the farmers of other provinces and countries, they must have the latest and best agricultural knowledge obtainable.

As it is manifestly impossible for all these young people to attend colleges teaching agriculture and home economics, the Department each year arranges to hold short courses in every county, where, free of charge, these interested young people receive lectures from experts in every line of agriculture and home economics and take part in practical work and demonstrations. Diplomas are awarded at the conclusion of each course. The only entrance requirement is a willingness to learn.

Short course work is under the general supervision of R. S. Duncan, Director of Agricultural Representatives, with the agricultural representative in each county being principal of the school.

There are five courses each lasting three months and 32 one month courses. In some counties there will be a series of special meetings and in others there will be four one-week courses.

Last year 1313 boys and 2866 girls attended and this year it is confidently expected the attendance will be over 3,000.

Following is a list of the dates and places of short courses. Boys and girls interested should get in touch immediately with their county agricultural representative:

November 22, 1938—February 26, 1939—Bruce County, Tara; Halton, Acton; Hastings, Stirling; Peterboro, Keene; Wentworth, Freeton.

One Month Courses—November 22—December 16—Dundas, Osnabrock Centre; Glengarry, Bainsville; Grey, McIntyre; Northumberland, Warkworth; Prescott and Russell, St. Isidore; (Note—Course in agriculture held in December, home economics in January) Renfrew, Golden Lake; North Simcoe, Mitchell Square.

January 2-26, 1939—Durham, Blackstock; Elgin, Clachan; Essex, Comber; Frontenac, Brewer's Mills; Grey, Meaford; Huron, Dashwood; Lambton, Theodford; Lanark, Pakenham; Middlesex, Thorndale; Peel, Trinity; North Simcoe, Waverley; Waterloo, New Germany; Wellington, Palmerston; York, Victoria Square.

**TESTED RECIPE**

WITH the departure of summer sunshine and the arrival of cold weather, mothers naturally will plan to serve more substantial food. Here is a dessert for a nippy day which not only supplies important food values, but is also supremely good to eat.

**Coconut Molasses Cake**

¾ cup sifted cake flour; 2½ teaspoons double-acting baking powder; ¼ teaspoon salt; ¼ teaspoon soda; ½ teaspoon allspice; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; ¼ cup butter or other shortening; ¾ cup brown sugar, firmly packed; 1 egg, unbeaten; ½ cup molasses; ½ cup milk; 1½ cup shredded coconut, coarsely cut.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, soda, and spices, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat well; then molasses. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Fold in coconut. Bake in greased pan, 8 x 8 x 2-inches, in moderate oven (375° F.), 45 minutes, or until done.

**PILGRIMAGE IN 1940**

A new Canadian Legion Pilgrimage to Vimy and the Great War Battlefields in France and Belgium is being planned for 1940. On the last pilgrimage in 1938, 6,200 Canadians made the trip in five boats and one thousand others who also intended to go were forced to stay at home because all available accommodation was taken up. The Legion expects to make the 1940 pilgrimage a greater success than the original and if the international situation is not too critical, there is little doubt but that many Canadians will take advantage of the opportunity that such an excursion offers. A rough canvass of the number of prospective pilgrims is now being conducted with a view to ascertaining how many ships will be required to transport the great crowd.

**New Public School For Caledon District**

No longer will residents of Caledon district hear the peal of the bell which for fifty years had called the children to their studies at the old school building, which has been the seat of learning for five decades, will be dismantled and torn down.

A modern new five-room school has been erected to the rear of the original site. The building is steam-heated, the walls being of tile brick with a potted roof. The basement contains the manual training and domestic science rooms and on the second floor are three well lighted rooms. There is accommodation for seventy students.

The building was erected under the direction of Inspector A. B. Hensall. Plans were prepared by Architect R. W. Hall, of Brampton, and John Rae and Sons, of Toronto, were general contractors, plumbing being done by A. Spratt and Son, Inglewood, and electrical work by W. J. Stubbs and Son, Caledon.

**APPLE EXPORTER—IMPORTER**

Although Argentina is a large exporter of apples and grows practically every class of fruit, including pears, plums, peaches, grapefruit, olives, lemons, oranges and bananas, 14,360 boxes of Canadian apples were imported during the 1937-38 season.
