### ONTARIO NOW SEEKS VALUE OF FORESTS

**Former Provincial Premier Makes Reforestation Tour**  
"This province is finally waking up to the necessity of conserving forests and passing them on to our children," E. C. Drury, former premier of the province of Ontario, said last week in addressing 250 county councillors and county officials representative of 19 counties in this province, at a banquet held at Angus, Ont., which terminated the first day of the conservation forestry and plowing match tour.  
"We are finally realizing the mistakes of the lumber industry," he continued, "who have been utterly careless of this province's future."  
Mr. Drury emphasized the effect that reforestation has over the control of floods and rainstorms.  
"Why is it that the large European rivers never overflow their banks and cause millions of dollars of havoc and our small Grand and Thames rivers do?" he asked. "It is because these countries know the value of reforesting certain areas and we are entirely ignorant of it," he answered in the same breath.
