The barrel of home-canned fruit and pickles came through without a mishap, all credit due to your expert packer.
I'm going to have the huckleberries now and the rest I shall hoard until our larger gets emptier. We have fresh apples, and with care we won't have to have any Victory tinned fruit. I am so grateful to you all.
Thanks for the second hand things too, they are always acceptable.
Trust I shall be able to see you sometime. I feel that you are my very good friends. Best wishes to you all.

TOWN AFFAIRS IN GOOD CONDITION NOMINATION MEETING TOLD

Chairman C. R. Dayfoot of the High School Board, said that Georgetown school had one of the best ratings in the province. That music and art had been added to the curriculum, and that the Board was fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Carman Sutcliffe as director for Forms I to V. A "Clubs" Club of some 30 members had been formed and would take part at the commencement exercises next month. He spoke of other achievements of the school. 151 Pupils, an increase of 15 over 1937, are now on the roll. Mr. Dayfoot said the Board had expended more than their estimate this year, owing to some \$440 needed for repairs to the roof of the school. The chairman did not go into the High School addition in detail, but stressed the need for such an addition in order to cope with present day education regulations and give Georgetown pupils the same advantages as other schools. He said that when the government and county grants had been received against the proposed addition, the cost to the town would amount only to about \$1,000.00 a year over a twenty year period. A little less than a mill on the rate, Mr. Dayfoot also stated that the Ontario Fire Marshal's Department had ordered drastic changes in the location of the heating system, owing to a fire hazard, but had stayed the order for a time, so that should the town consider an addition this expense could be met at the same time and prevent duplication. They would not bring this matter before the ratepayers at present, but something would have to be done sooner or later.

Mr. John D. Kelly, of the Public School Board addressed the meeting in regard to the Public School. He said that Georgetown was fortunate in having such a competent staff at the school, and that the school rated among the best in the province. Mr. Kelly assured the ratepayers the Board had tried to keep within the same time and prevent duplication. The School Board was making plans for a safety patrol, to care for the children crossing the highway at school hours. He hoped the plan would soon go into effect. The safety patrol plan is also being taken up by the provincial government. He had been a member of the Board for eight years, and appreciated the acclamation accorded him for 1938.

Mr. Fred McNally, who was nominated for councillor in Ward Three, thanked his nominees for proposing his name, but said he would be unable to fill the position.
Mr. H. C. Dayfoot was acclaimed Hydro Commissioner, and Miss A. Ryan and Mr. H. Dickie elected to the School Board by acclamation.
