Chief changes in the playing rules as set forth at the O.H.A. meeting are as follows:

- Goal crease reduced from an area 8 x 5 feet to 7 x 3 feet. Blue line enlarged from 4 inches to 12 inches.
- Penalty shot to be taken from centre ice and shooter permitted to skate over penalty shot line after making his shot.
- No minor penalties to be awarded to a goalkeeper—penalty shots instead.
- Minor penalty for any player except a goalkeeper, who "freezes" the puck against the boards unless he is being checked by an opponent.
- Goalkeeper must not hold the puck with his hands or arms more than three seconds, must not throw the puck forward, or drop it in his pads, or throw the puck into spectators' seats.
