LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

"The Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, which is celebrating the semi-centenary of its foundation in Ottawa shortly, is one of those organizations whose genesis is to be found in a response to an almost universal demand. The purpose of the Alliance once firmly stated, some years of quiet, educational work went on before the Lord's Day Act was put upon the statute books in 1906.

"The Lord's Day Act would never have been the success it is had not that same admirable quality of common-sense been generously applied in its enforcement. The Alliance has relied upon reason rather than upon coercion for the enforcement of the principle of weekly rest in Canada, and the result has been to strengthen rather than to weaken, the estimation in which it is held by the employing class, which otherwise might have been its deadliest and most effective enemies.

"The purpose for which the Alliance exists needs no elaboration and no praise here. 'Live and let live' is a good motto, but it can be made to cover a multitude of meanesses and tyrannies. The Alliance asks only that industrial slavery shall not exist in Canada and that Sunday shall be the Emancipation Day of the very great majority of the people. It is 'practical Christianity' that is all."—From the "Montreal Daily Star."

VEGETABLE PRODUCTS

Canadian manufacturers based on vegetable products form an important group in Canadian industry. According to the latest statistics this group ranked first in the Dominion in 1936 in gross value and cost of the materials used, third in capital invested, and fourth in the number of persons employed and salaries and wages paid.

Exports from Canada cover all phases of manufactured vegetable products but in the present review do not include those of chemicals, fibre and wood. The exports include fruits and vegetables, pickles, sauces, ketchups, milled products, bran, shorts, middlings, oatmeal and rolled oats, flour of wheat and other milled products, biscuits, cereal foods, corn starch, macaroni, vermicelli, spaghetti, malt, screenings, confectionery and chewing gum, maple syrup and sugar, molasses, syrups, sugar of all kinds, coffee, vinegar, beverages, rubber and its products (belting, shoes, tires, casings, and inner tubes) tobacco and cigarettes, oil cake, vegetable oils and other vegetable products. The value of vegetable products exported from Canada in 1936 was \$81,219,005.

The Sin of Covetousness

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson, December 11th, 1938

GOLDEN TEXT: "Thou shalt not covet." Exodus 20: 17.

LESSON PASSAGE: Exodus 20: 17; Luke 12: 13-21; 1 Timothy 6: 6-10.

Lord of the sunlight.
Lord of the starlight.
Lord of the seasons.
Teach me to know
How best to love thee.
How best to serve thee.
Mid summer's showers or winter's snow.

A Sin in the Mind. 17

Covetousness is an attitude of mind. It begins in desire. The acquisitive habit may lead to outward acts, but at first it is yearning for something that belongs to another. One great trouble in the life of individuals and nations alike is that so many are playing the ancient game of grab. Yet possessions in themselves do not satisfy the higher longings of human beings. Frequently possessions when attained clutter up the mind and become a waste of life's opportunities. If covetousness is a mental sin the cure must be obtained through changed thinking. We may cure ourselves of the desire to have more than our neighbors or to get gain for ourselves at another's loss. There are many statutes in both criminal and civil law protecting property rights. Many of those would be unnecessary were it not for the deep-rooted desire for possessions which others have earned by their own toil. Our materialistic age must change its thinking before its conduct will improve greatly.

Family Quarrels, 13 - 15

There is much litigation over wills. There are many disputes about individual rights in homes. Some of the bitterest family feuds have arisen through disputes concerning articles of small value. Jesus saw clearly that the desire for material possessions could easily destroy family love. A man came to Jesus asking him to act as a magistrate and pronounce a decision about the division of family property. Jesus left the decision to a judge and began to deal with the man's heart. The self-seeking property-minded man was warned against covetousness and counselled to seek his satisfactions on higher levels.

Living for Things, 16 - 21

A modern motion picture has as its title, "You Can't Take It With You." This is the twentieth century way of teaching the old proverb that there are no pockets in a shroud. Men and women will work for fifty years seeking financial security only to find that spiritual peace is a greater reality. Christ showed the futility of our acquisitive society when he pictured the rich man pulling down his barns and building greater and greater looking forward to years of ease and indulgence. Yet death in a moment could separate him from all his great possessions. The rich fool laid up treasure for himself but was not rich toward God. Jesus left no estate, yet no life has influenced human history as his has done.

Contentment, 6 - 8

Clear thinking is necessary in the discussion of contentment. God teaches within us a divine discontent which is an urge to progress and improvement. It is right that a settler whose first house is of logs should advance to a larger frame building and structure. Constant improvement encourages business and prevents unemployment. The fact to stress is that inner happiness does not depend upon affluent circumstances. Many pioneer families were happier in the first log house than in later pretentious homes. It is a matter of placing first things first. Our primary duty is to discover the will of God and do our utmost to obey it. Inner peace depends much more upon conscience than upon chattels. It was said of John Calvin that money could not tempt him. He had found life's satisfaction in study, worship and service. Much of the economic cruelty of to-day is due to materialistic greed. To progress quickly, to surpass competitors, to be able to live with extravagant display of wealth, too often lead to ruthlessness in competitive methods. It is possible to think great thoughts dwelling in a humble home—and wearing inexpensive clothes. In a certain university it was discovered that the outstanding intellectual leader spent only about one-third upon his wardrobe, compared with well-to-do students.

The Love of Money, 9 - 10

Money is not the root of all evil. Money is the source of much good. It can give shelter to the homeless, clothing to the cold, food to the hungry, education to seeking minds. Money does miracles. It can transform stone out of a quarry into a beautiful cathedral. It can take the grain of the fields and support family life, schools, churches, libraries and art galleries. Why then is money suspect? It is because money is so often loved for what it is rather than for what it can do. There is a world of difference between hoarding money in a bank account and spending it to brighten the lives of neglected children. When a man wishes to be known for what he is rather than for what he is, his sense of values is distorted. The Christian's Church must seek to undo the prevalent habit of making money a public idol. Material wealth can be a good servant. It should never be master. One our master ever Christ.
