system of following up and caring for contacts, and increasing high standard of milk. Recent legislation has made it compulsory for "open cases" of tuberculosis (those who will infect others in the household) to enter sanatoria and remain there until they can no longer infect others. The municipality is no longer charged for the maintenance of such cases in sanatoria or those under treatment by tuberculosis clinics.

Water Supply
No infections in Georgetown could be attributed to the water supply in 1938. 12 Samples were sent to the Department of Health at Toronto for tests. Of these 9 were satisfactory and 3 showed evidence of human or animal pollution of the water supply. This indicates that the town is not protected against a pollution which might be followed by serious results. This situation has been present for many years and apparently has not caused any sickness. Every effort is being made to minimize the danger by a yearly emptying and cleaning of the reservoir and the prevention of entry of anyone in the premises of the reservoir. The only method of ensuring a perfectly safe water supply is by chlorination. It is also recommended that strainers be attached to all household water taps.

Milk Supply
Milk By-law No. 64A was passed 1927. Amended 1928. Pasteurization not compulsory until Oct. 1, 1938. Number of inspectors, 1. Number of pasteurization plants, 2. 67% of total supply pasteurized before Oct. 1st, 1938. Total average daily consumption, 950 quarts. Per capita per day consumption, 8 pints. Number of producers, 15. Number of distributors, 7. Milk inspections—Visits made to producers, 91; to distributors raw milk, 40; to distributors of pasteurized milk, 12 total 143.

The condition of the milk supply is now very satisfactory. Since Oct. 1, 1938, all milk and cream used in Georgetown is pasteurized. The Milk Inspector, Dr. R. Learmonth, regularly inspects the premises of herds which supply the local pasteurization plants and the plants. Without exception the producers and distributors are anxious to cooperate in making the town supply of milk as clean and safe as possible. It is being arranged to send samples of milk from the pasteurization plants regularly to the Laboratories of the Department of Health at Toronto for tests. The per capita consumption of 8 pints of milk, added to which is canned milk and milk products, is a high standard of milk consumption. There are, however, families who use less milk than is necessary for health. It is considered that adults should consume at least 1 pint and children 1 1/2 to 2 pints of milk daily. All in Georgetown are now assured of a

wholesome supply of milk.
Sanitary Inspection of Schools
These on the whole are satisfactory. The school boards are alive to their responsibility in this respect. Improvements in sanitary conditions are being made continually.

Complaints
These can be grouped under three headings:
1. Complaints due to faulty disposal of sewer material.
2. Complaints due to faulty disposal of garbage material.
3. Miscellaneous complaints, e.g., street dust, non-reporting of communicable disease, breaking of quarantine, infestation of homes with vermin, etc.; improper living conditions, etc.

1. Faulty disposal of sewer material: This is becoming an increasingly worrying problem. 90% of all complaints received by your Board of Health are concerned with overflowing cess-pools and septic tanks with consequent unsightliness, foul odours, attraction of flies, and contamination of ground. They are a definite source of disease. Cases are encountered where little can be done to remedy the condition. Dr. E. Berry, Chief Sanitary Engineer of the Ontario Department of Health addressed the Town Council in September, and stated that a sewer system was long overdue in Georgetown. He recommended that such an installation be seriously considered.

The firm of Haggy, Gray & Plunkett, Ltd., Consulting Engineers were engaged by the Town Council to make a complete survey of the town this summer, to draw plans and submit an estimate of cost. This was done, and the plans submitted to the Ontario Department of Health where they were approved. It was found that the terrain was exceptionally well adapted for such an installation and that the cost is moderate for this reason. All that remains is for authority to be given to commence the work. It is probable that rate-payers will have an opportunity to vote upon this proposed improvement early in 1939.

2. Faulty Disposal of Garbage Material: It is recommended that at some future time a municipal system of garbage collection and disposal be inaugurated. A few householders continue to be careless about the disposal of their garbage, but fewer complaints have been received this year about garbage being left on unauthorised lots. The municipal dump in the park continues to be a problem. It is a breeding place for rats and flies; dogs frequently bring into town offensive refuse which is picked up there.

3. Miscellaneous complaints have been dealt with as they arose.

Clinic Services
The following is a list of clinic services given by the Board of Health:—Vaccination, number held 1; attendance 40. Toxoid, number held 2; attendance 102. Dental, number held, in formal, attendance 14. Ear, nose and throat, number held 16; attendance 16. Note—Of these 7 children's tonsils

and adenoids were removed at the Hospital for Sick Children.

Health work is being carried on in the municipality by agencies other than the Board of Health, as follows: The Women's Institute and Local Council of Women have contributed time and money toward the Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic. They may have the satisfaction of knowing that practically every child who has been given special attention through this clinic has been healthier and happier since.

The Lions Club in collaboration with the Department of Health have undertaken a survey of teeth of every child in the public school. They have outlined a very ambitious program, which will be of great value to the dental health of the school. In addition to these organizations our 1938 activities would have been impossible without the aid of our School Nurse, Miss M. Kennedy, our Milk Inspector, Dr. R. Learmonth, our Sanitary Inspector, Mr. W. G. Marshall, and our Town Clerk, Mr. F. E. Harrison. All have been most efficient and have the interests of the health of the town at heart.

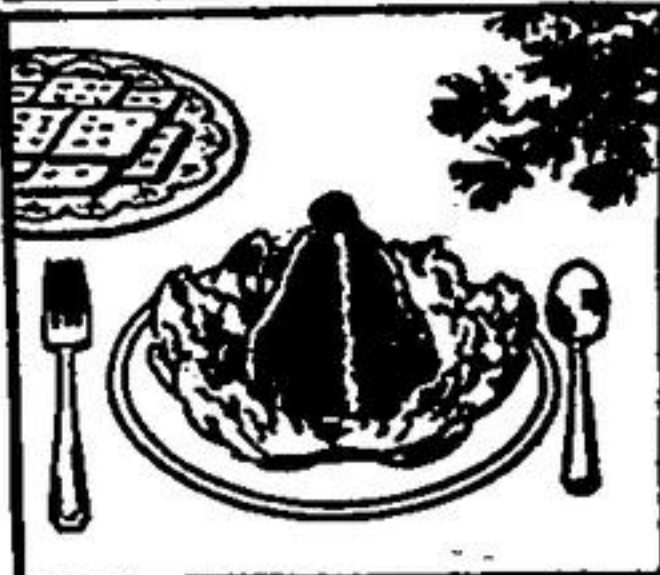

ACCIDENTS AND COMPENSATION

During the month of November there were 5,282 accidents reported to The Workmen's Compensation Board, as compared with 5,006 during October, and 6,629 during November a year ago. There was awarded in benefits, \$581,814.33, of which \$487,901.02 was for compensation and \$93,913.30 for medical aid. This year's record to date shows a total of 55,374 accidents reported, as compared with 64,854 during the same period last year, and the benefits awarded to date this year amount to \$5,859,306.31, as compared with \$5,567,403.90 to the end of November last year.

Pears Make Elegant Addition to Menu

In cottage or castle, baked fresh, large pears stuffed with minccmeat are "simply elegant." Pare and core either Bosc or Anjou variety pears from the Pacific coast, which are both on the market now. (These are winter-time variety pears.) Stew them with minccmeat, and sprinkle the stuffed pears with sugar before baking—1 teaspoon sugar to each pear. Bake about 45 minutes, basting with the syrup from the minccmeat as it cooks, and serve hot with creamed cheese melted over the top, or a hard sauce.

"Pink Pears" with Meat
Garnish meat—ham, roast, turkey, chicken or whatnot—with pink blushing pears, made this way: peel and core Bosc or Anjou variety pears, and halve them. Cook the pears gently until tender in a thin syrup made of one cup sugar, one cup water, to which has been added a handful of cinnamon candies or a few drops of red vegetable coloring.

Bell-Shaped Salad
Jingle-bell season, Christmas, bride-to-be, or just party, will be more glamorous if the salad is attractive and delicious. Ask your grocer for figs, juicy Anjou pears from the Pacific Coast. Ingredients: Anjou pears (one per person), red coloring, cream cheese, lettuce, mayonnaise. Place peeled and halved Anjou pears in red coloring (red cinnamon candy, or vegetable coloring) which has been dissolved in water, and let pears remain until delicate pink; then drain. Spread cut sides of pears with creamed cheese, and press two halves together. Cut a slice off the bottom of the large end of pear, so it will stand straight, and give the appearance of a bell. Place on lettuce. Decorate sides of the bell with four lengthwise lines of creamed cheese (use a pastry tube for this if you have one) being sure that two of these lines cover the division between the halves. Top with a maraschino cherry. Serve with mayonnaise.
