GOD'S GREAT LOVE

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson, December 25, 1938

GOLDEN TEXT: "God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3: 16.

LESSON PASSAGE: Matthew 2: 1-12. True love is born and exists in a realm beyond this world—in God himself, in God, and in God alone. When our souls are silent before Him.

The Wise Men, 1, 2
Many people come to Christ through the avenue of their own interest. The Wise Men were astronomers and a star led them to Jesus. The disciples were fishermen and Christ told them that he would make them fishers of men. The woman of Samaria—went to the well to draw water and she learned from Jesus about the water of life. Certain Greeks came to Jesus out of curiosity, which Jesus speedily satisfied. Our daily work or dominant thoughts may open doors through which we may come to Christ. The Wise Men respected scholars, but humble workmen found in Christ all that they desired. The Wise Men demonstrated the truth of Christ's teaching, that those who seek will find. They travelled a long distance, but their journey was not made in vain.

A Troubled King, 3 - 6
Roman governors must have been constantly perplexed at the convictions of the people of Jerusalem and surrounding district. The religious customs of the Jews were far different from those in Rome. The observance of the Sabbath Day, the devotion to the law and the Scriptures, the sacrifices of the priests and the hope of a great deliverer, were far beyond the thinking of such a man as Herod. He hardly knew whether to take this Jewish religion seriously or not, but he could not fail to see that the Jews took their religion seriously. He sought to find out where their long-expected king was to be born. His interest was in political administration, not in religious experience. It was his task as governor to put down all revolution and he was afraid that the spiritual hope of the Hebrews would lead to a ruler. Actually, a greater change took place than ever Herod feared.

The Search Rewarded, 7 - 10
The Christmas story should be read imaginatively, trying to visualize the village of Bethlehem, seeing the shepherds sing their songs, the Wise Men present their gifts. It is possible for us to enter into the joy of the men who followed the star to Bethlehem. "When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceeding great joy." They felt that their leading had been vindicated. Little did they know the extent to which the destiny of human beings was to be bound up with the life of the Babe of Bethlehem. Several of the objective results are the New Testament, the Christian Church, the sacraments, the symbol of the cross. But even greater has been the effect of new attitudes in human hearts. The Babe of Bethlehem is known as the Prince of Peace, the Great Physician, the Master and Teacher of men. Looking back over nineteen centuries of Christian history, we are better able to estimate the importance of that birth in a village stable.

First Christmas Gifts, 11
We have to read between the lines to understand why the Wise Men bowed in worship before the baby Jesus. All their thoughts are not recorded in the narrative. A great expectation had been awakened in their minds. With patience they had followed the star and at last their search had been rewarded. They had come prepared to give royal gifts. They presented gold, frankincense and myrrh, symbolizing substance, influence and service. It is impossible to calculate the value of the gifts that have been given in the name of Christ. Perhaps Christ values the money gifts less than love to himself and service to others in his name. Even the poorest of us may give to Christ if we are willing to give ourselves. That is the gift he desires above all others, the free surrender of ourselves to him, in order that he may lead us closer to God.

Warned in a Dream, 12
Herod had laid his plot but it was foiled. The Wise Men suspected his motive and instead of reporting to Herod, they returned to their own country by another route. In infancy, the life of Jesus was in danger. Joseph and Mary fled to Egypt for safety. During his public ministry his life

was in danger. Eventually, he was crucified upon a cross. To-day, the cause of Christ is in danger in many countries of the world. His Church is oppressed, his teachings are forbidden, his name is vilified. Yet he continues to use the methods of his ministry, truth, service and love. In the end, he will win, and by peaceful, educational methods. Dictators may command armies, navies and air forces, but Christ is still the lover of human hearts. This Christmas, let us try to understand what it would mean to persecuted people of many nations if the love of Jesus Christ ruled in all human hearts. Let us earnestly pray that the war spirit may recede, and that the nations which have suffered so cruelly through war may not return evil for evil, but may exalt the standard of good-will, taught and led by the Prince of Peace.

Questions for Discussion

1. Why does the fact the Jesus was a Jew fail to prevent persecution of the Jews?
2. How does scholarship pay homage to Christ?
3. Why has Christianity failed to solve the problems between Jews and Arabs in Palestine?
4. What would be your attitude to Christmas if you were in Spain?
5. Discuss rearmament and relief in the light of Christmas.
