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CALEDON TOWNSHIP PROVIDES MANY PEEL COUNTY WARDENS

Archives of Caledon Township reveal the fact that in 89 years only 32 men have occupied the reeve's chair in this township. Wm. Stone was the township's first reeve and held the position only for the year 1850.

John Richardson, his successor, held the position for seven years, a record only equaled by Alex. MacLaren, who was reeve also for seven years. For a period of ten years at the turn of the century Reeves were not members of county council, a special commission conducting county affairs.

Of these 32 men, eight have served as wardens of Peel County. They were: Alex. MacLaren, George Atkinson; H. Bracken, R. B. Henry, Ed. Ellis, J. A. McBride, W. J. Limebeer and John Willis. The present reeve, A. D. McBride, has announced his candidature for 1939.

During the time a county commission was in vogue, Robert Johnston, a commissioner for this township, also occupied the warden's chair.

MISS L. WALDIE DIES AT HOME

Well known for her interest in welfare and various women's organizations, Miss Lillie Waldie died Tuesday morning, Dec. 27th, at her home, 48 Castle Frank Road, Toronto, following a brief illness from a heart condition. Miss Waldie was the daughter of the late John Waldie, a former M.P. for Halton County, and Mrs. Waldie.

Born in Burlington, she received her education at Miss Dupont's Private School, Toronto. For many years, "Glenhurst," one of Rosedale's historic homesites, was the home of the Waldie family.
