—The W.C.T.U. will meet at the home of Mrs. A. R. Speight on Friday, Jan. 13th at 3 p.m. Rev. Charles Joffile will address the meeting.

—Orilla last week voted to remain dry by-law which would have authorized opening of beverage rooms in the town was rejected by a vote of 804 to 450.

—Chester Earl, chief of Milton's volunteer fire brigade, reports that no loss had been caused by fires there during the past year. This is the second year that this condition has existed.

—Daniel Mitchell, 18, of Nassagaweya township, was fined \$8 and costs by Magistrate W. F. Woodliffe at Milton last week when he pleaded guilty to allowing a juvenile to drive his car.

—Leslie Louth, pro at the Oakville Golf Club for 10 years, left last week to take charge of a Bermuda golf club. He is expected to return to the club here in April when he will again be available to the rapidly increasing club membership.

—The most severe epidemic of measles in some years is being experienced in Milton. Numerous pupils are absent from their seats in the junior forms of public school, but the disease is not sufficiently widespread as yet to warrant closing the building.

—In the last three years, mining in Canada has created new jobs for 30,000 Canadians, and last year it distributed no less than \$135,000,000 in wages and salaries according to Hon. T. A. Crerar, Federal Minister of Natural Resources.

—1939 will be unique in one respect. While it will have fifty-two weeks the same as any other year it will have fifty-three Sundays. The extra Sunday is due to the fact that the year commenced on Sunday and will end on a Sunday.

—The estate of Tony Okiend, of Oakville, mining magnate, who died in Miami, Florida, March 7th last, was greatly enlarged recently by \$62,550, Surrogate Court records show. This is due to a personal estate not itemized and brings the estate up to a total of \$31,549.

—Negotiations are about completed for the sale of Stanley Park, Erin. The prospective purchaser is Mr. G. W. Henderson of Clarkson a native of Erin, Ireland. With this for his birthplace it is perhaps only natural that Mr. Henderson should choose to locate in Erin, Ont.

—The Women's Association of Georgetown United Church will hold an afternoon tea and traveltalk in the basement of the church on Thursday, Jan. 19th, at 3 p.m. Mrs. H. W. Kennedy will give an account of her trip along the Pacific Coast to Alaska.

—In Chesley a by-law to authorize a \$40,000 debenture issue for additions and renovations to the Chesley high school was submitted to the by-lawyers on election day. The by-law was endorsed on a vote of 1 to 1. Evidently a very lively support is given to educational affairs in Chesley.

—Town statistics reveal that the population of Milton increased by eight during the past year. There were 33 births as compared with 29 in the previous year but marriages were five below the figure for 1937. Deaths were listed at 15, were four less than they were the year before, the report said.

INAUGURAL MEETING OF GEORGETOWN TOWN COUNCIL (Continued from Page 1)

engaged the engineering firm of Hagey, Gray and Flunkett Ltd. who made a complete survey of the municipality and submitted plans and specifications for a modern sewage system at an estimated cost of \$127,000.00.

It is my intention in the near future to introduce to the members of the council the matter of submitting to the electors for their approval or disapproval those two capital expenditures.

Not being unmindful of the recent financial difficulties from which the municipality is slowly recovering, having in mind the fact that better business and working conditions for home-owners are in no way assured for the future and realizing that increased taxation would necessitate increased rents to tenants, I am convinced that now is the time and place for me to express my considered opinion that it would be unwise to burden real-estate to the extent of one or both of these proposed expenditures, and that I am unalterably opposed to such capital expenditure until the present bonded indebtedness has been retired. If, however, the electors by their votes decide that the necessity for better educational facilities and the need for more convenient and sanitary sewage disposal outweigh the financial responsibilities pertaining thereto, I shall consider it my duty and the duty of my colleagues in council to see that the work is commenced without delay and as efficiently and economically as possible.

I am able today to look back upon eight years of public service to the town of one of the best towns for its size and population in this great Province of Ontario, and bring back many pleasant memories of my associations with members of the council, organizations and citizens generally. True, I have made mistakes, but I submit I have made an honest effort to transact public business conscientiously, fearlessly and independently for what I thought was in the best interests of the majority of the people.

The Canadian Government has announced that their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth will visit Canada during midsummer of this year. It is my intention at that time to proclaim a civic holiday on some suitable date so that the citizens of Georgetown may have an opportunity to fittingly celebrate the Royal visit to this country. I suggest to my fellow members of the council that transportation should be arranged for all the children of public school age in the municipality to attend a public appearance of their Majesties in the Capital city of Ontario.

It is my desire to express my appreciation and gratitude for the confidence that has been placed in me by electing me by acclamation for the present year, and I assure the citizens during my term of office—that confidence will spur me on to continued devotion to public duty and renewed efforts for greater achieve-
