NORVAL RIFLE CLUB OF 1938 IN REVIEW

HARVEY NURSE ELECTED PRESIDENT OF CLUB FOR 1939

The Norval Rifle Club held their annual meeting on the club range on Monday night, Jan. 16th. A review of the events for the year was read by the chairman, Mr. R. W. Hall, also the financial statement which showed a substantial balance to the credit of the club for the year ending December 31st, 1938.

Mr. Harvey Nurse was elected president and Mr. E. J. Gollop re-elected secretary. Mr. F. Hustler elected assistant secretary. The following members were chosen as a general purpose committee, viz. R. W. Hall, Fred Johnston, M. Atkinson, Geo. O. Brown and H. Nurse.

On Monday night, January 9th, sixteen members of the Norval Rifle Club visited the Hillsburg Club defeating them by 54 points out of 1600. The scores Norval 1558 out of 1600, Hillsburg 1504 out of 1600. Four of the Norval Club scored the possible of 100 points. Mr. Sinclair of the Hillsburg team was high scorer for his team with 99 points.

A review of the events which took place on the Norval Rifle Range and other ranges by the Norval Rifle Club during the year ending December 31, 1938.

The Indoor League as sponsored by the Dominion Marksmen of Montreal, was competed for in January and February. This competition was Canada-wide and was divided into four districts, viz. Newfoundland, Maritime provinces, Central District (Ontario and Quebec), and the Western provinces. Norval entered two teams in the central district, No. 1 team winning fifth place and No. 2 team seventeenth place. Twenty-seven teams competed in the Central District.

Three Expert Spoons and five Marksmen's Spoons were won by the Norval Club.

In the Outdoor League, 50 and 100 yards, 40 shots at each range, Mr. Harvey Nurse was high scorer, making 793 points out of 800.

On June 3rd and 4th, a rifle meet was held on the Norval Outdoor range open to marksmen of Canada and the United States. This meet being an initial for the Norval club, was well attended by riflemen from all parts of Ontario and the Border Towns and Cities of the United States. The meet was a decided success both financially and otherwise. Much credit is due our Mr. R. W. Hall for his energetic and able ability in sponsoring and conducting this meet. Should a similar meet take place in 1939, it is predicted that the success will be even greater.

Our Mr. Harvey Nurse won the Dominion of Canada Challenge Shield in the small bore matches held at Ottawa in the August meet of the R.A. Mr. Nurse also won the Grand Aggregate at the O.R.A. matches held at Long Branch. Congratulations Harvey.

Mr. Fred Johnson won the Novelty Shield for the highest score in the three novelty shoots—ten shots each at off hand, rapid fire and prone.

Mr. Harvey Nurse is high scorer in the year's aggregate shoots, scoring 3282 points out of 3300.

Sabbath Threatened by Organized Sport

Lord's Day Group Will Launch Aggressive Campaign Against Repeal
FEAR WIDE-OPEN SUNDAY
Toronto, Jan. 17th—Ontario's Sunday is in imminent peril through proposed introduction of commercialized Sunday activities, declared Rev. G. G. Webber, general secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, in a statement issued to the press today.

The introduction of the business of sport into Ontario Sunday life would be but the first step toward a wide-open Sunday, and that in turn would mean the loss of the Sunday rest day to increasing numbers of citizens, Mr. Webber stated. He was commenting on the recent intimation given by Attorney-General Gordon Conant that the Ontario government would ask Ottawa to repeal the pre-Confederation statute of 1845.

"The only legislation that could be introduced into the Federal parliament, the Ontario legislature designed to increase Sunday sports activities," Mr. Webber stated, "would legalize professional and commercialized sport on that day. That is the issue we must face. Let us discuss it frankly and without any camouflage whatever."

"Mr. Webber asked: 'Does Ontario want professional and commercialized sports on Sundays? We believe those who want a wide-open Sunday are very much in the minority, even though we recognize that many citizens are desirous for freedom on Sundays for personal and voluntary recreation.'"

The general secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance pointed out that "the Lord's Day Act of Canada does not forbid personal recreation on Sundays. That law gives the poor man the same liberty as the rich man. Of course, the poor man does not have the same amount of money to spend on recreation any day of the week, and the only way in which recreational privileges could be equalized would be to increase the income of all people on the lower levels of income. That, of course, is another story and one which we cannot discuss here... But all this talk of introducing legislation to benefit the poor man with respect to his Sunday recreation simply belittles the real issue."

A Must-be-eaten Dessert

A most delightful and modern version of a traditional festive holiday pudding in which is molded in gelatin and, of course, served cold. It is a most fitting end to a party dinner — yet it is so light that not one of your guests will decline it with the regretful plea "I've no more room."

Jellied Holiday Pudding
1 package cherry flavored gelatin; 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon; 1/4 teaspoon cloves; dash of salt; 1 pint hot water; 1/4 cup brandy; 1/4 cup chopped prunes; 1/4 cup chopped cooked raisins; 1/4 cup silted citron; 1/4 cup broken walnut meats. Combine gelatin, spices, and salt; mix well and dissolve in hot water. Cool and add brandy. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in remaining ingredients. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Serve with your favorite sauce. Serves 10.

Canada for the past few years has supplied a large part of the wheat requirements of Norway. During the three years 1935-37, imports from the Dominion amounted to 265,000 metric tons, or more than 52 per cent of Norway's what imports of 500,000 tons during that period. This is an average of 88,500 tons per year over the three years. On October 18, 1938, 8,000 tons of the highest quality of Canadian wheat arrived at Oslo, the Capital of Norway. This is one of the largest shipments of grain received by the Norwegian state Grain Monopoly which is the sole purchaser of grains for the country.
