THIS AND THAT IN SPORT

OWING to the writer taking a week-end jaunt to one of Ontario's finest gold-mining districts, Larder Lake, this column will have to be curtailed this week, and during our absence we seem to have missed out on some very important hockey happenings.

IN OUR absence it seems Georgetown's master minds of hockey have been running down some leads in the Bolton district and find that some of Bolton's intermediate players not only play mercantile hockey in Toronto but hail from the metropolis themselves. We believe the O.H.A. ruling says that city of Toronto players can not play O. H. A. hockey in centres outside of Toronto; while should they reside in the suburbs they may play for the nearest O.H.A. team. This information, which was secured from one of the Bolton executive, and which was given after taking him completely off guard, has no doubt been laid before the O.H.A. executive and which can be dealt with in only one way. This action should be taken rather short-handed after disposing of the imports. We understand a protest should not be necessary to disqualify these players, as the O.H.A. can take matters in their own hands. "Bunny" Morgan-son of the Toronto Telegram has taken up the cudgel in an attempt to help the small towns keep these Toronto mercantile players from entering in O.H.A. teams outside the city.

IN THE meantime, while Georgetown have been getting the low-down on the Bolton set-up, Coach Walter McGillivray received a wire from the O.H.A. office advising him that he had been suspended from the position of coach indefinitely, owing to not heeding referee's warnings. The incident occurred in the Brampton Georgetown game of two weeks ago when the Georgetown team used six substitutes instead of the five allowed. Referee Johnny Jones warned McGillivray but the situation remained the same. However, the O.H.A. took up the matter and the game was awarded to Brampton. Georgetown had won 3 - 4. When McGillivray will be reinstated we cannot throw any light. Georgetown had previously protested the Long brothers on the Brampton team as not being able to qualify under the residence rule, but withdrew their complaint with the understanding that Brampton would do the same in regard to the extra player incident.

GEORGETOWN Intermediates go to Bolton on Friday night for a hectic game can be looked forward to. It is expected the Georgetown team will take a large contingent of supporters into the Peel Valley Town. Next Tuesday Bolton will meet Brampton at the arena here.

A Must-be-eaten Dessert

A most delightful and modern version of a traditional festive holiday pudding is one which is molded in gelatin and, of course, served cold. It is a most fitting end to a party dinner — yet it is so light that not one of your guests will decline it with the regretful plea "I've no more room."

Jellied Holiday Pudding.

1 package cherry flavored gelatin; 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon; 1/2 teaspoon cloves; dash of salt; 1 pint hot water; 1/2 cup brandy; 3/4 cup chopped raisins; 1/2 cup sliced citron; 1/2 cup sliced walnut meats. Combine gelatin, spices, and salt; mix well and dissolve in hot water. Cool and add brandy. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in remaining ingredients. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. unmold. Serve with whipped cream or your favorite sauce. Serv. 10.

The above will be strictly enforced. Also dog tax must be paid at time of assessment.
