Dainties Worthy of Valentine's Day

The orange crumb pie pictured above, as well as the other dishes featured below, are offered as suggestions for that Valentine's Day luncheon, dinner and evening party:

Orange Crumb Pie (Makes 1 pie)

- 2 egg yolks, beaten
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
Mix well and add:
1 1/2 cups milk
1 cup orange juice
1 teaspoon grated orange rind

Four the decaffeinated coffee over a pint of ice cream in a punch bowl or big mixing bowl, and blend lightly with an egg beater until the ice cream is partly melted.

Limas au Gratin

- 3 cups cooked, dried Limas
1 cup thin white sauce
1/2 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup buttered crumbs
1/2 teaspoon salt

Chocolate Peanut Butter Roll

- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk
1 1/2 cups confectioners' (4X) sugar
3 teaspoons peanut butter
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Sweet Dreams Punch

- 4 cups freshly made, chilled decaffeinated coffee
1 1/2 pints ice cream
Grated nutmeg

To make decaffeinated coffee by the percolator method, use 1 heaping tablespoon decaffeinated coffee, regular grind, for each cup (2 pints) of cold water.

Valentine Aspic
2 cups solid pack tomatoes
1 teaspoon dried thyme
1 teaspoon salt
6 cloves: 1/2 bay leaf
1/2 teaspoon grated onion

Hawaiian Pineapple Juice
Simmer the tomatoes with all of the seasonings and the water from the can of asparagus about 20 minutes, or until tomatoes are very soft.

While this is cooking, soak the gelatine in 1/4 cup of the pineapple juice. Over this pour the hot tomato juice and stir until gelatine is dissolved.
