THIS AND THAT IN SPORT

PUBLIC OPINION in regards to the suspension of Coach McGinnis is to the effect that while his actions may have been decidedly wrong in the eyes of the O.H.A., they were not of a serious nature and that he should be reinstated as soon as possible. Backed by this opinion the Georgetown Hockey Club have been urged to seek his reinstatement and we have forwarded a request to the O.H.A. secretary, Coach McGinnis has been a valuable cog in the hockey machinery here this winter, and it is hoped his suspension will soon be lifted.

IT SEEMS there has been a misunderstanding between the Brampton and Georgetown Clubs over the Long brothers being eligible to play for Brampton. Georgetown had at first laid a complaint before the O.H.A. but withdrew it on the understanding Brampton would withdraw their complaint over the twelve men used by Georgetown in the game of January 17th instead of the regulation eleven men. It is this matter that leads to the suspension of McGinnis. Whether Brampton did not do this or the O.H.A. took the matter in their own hands after receiving the referee's report, we cannot say; but we do feel McGinnis should be reinstated after being out of two games. Another angle is that the Brampton players could not produce player certificates for the Long brothers at this game when asked for by Referee Johnny Jones. This in itself, we believe, is an infraction of the O.H.A. rules.

MUCH INTEREST is being taken in the local hockey group at this time, now that both Georgetown and Brampton have resumed play. Last night's game with Bolton saw the boys from the Flower Town playing away over their heads. The game here next Monday night should just about prove what is liable to happen in the play-offs. We consider Georgetown is the team that will take a lot of beating if either Bolton or Brampton want to win this group. So come out and lend the home town boys your moral support.

"SHEENY" TOST is back on the local line-up, and has been in the past couple of games. Tost is playing some more good hockey and is a tower of strength to the second string line. With Tost on the wing and K. Richardson and "Sonny" at centre and right wing respectively, the second line is now almost on an equal with the first line of Riddall, W. Richardson and Ward. "Bungy" Ward is playing his best hockey this year, and his fast skating ability can not be matched by players on either the Bolton or Brampton team if he really turns it on. W. Richardson and G. IN OUR opinion Frank Dewhurst has been one of the best defencemen to take the ice for Georgetown, and it looks as if this year may be his big year. Frank has been going great guns and has a number of goals to his credit this season too.

LLOYD SANDERSON, who stepped up from Junior not so long ago, has been taking his turn both on defence and on the forward line. "Sandy" who filled in K. Richardson's place on the forward line in Bolton made a fine showing and notched a goal for his team.

AND LAST but not least we come to Georgetown's custodian of the net, Ernie Alcott. Being out of hockey for a number of seasons he has come back playing better than ever. And while some may be inclined to think he looks a bit weak on some goals, just take into account some of the ones he has saved. Keep it up for the play-offs Ernie.

IT IS expected that Dave Orichon will be on in the next two games with Bolton and Brampton, and will be sort of "groomed up" for the play-offs. Dave is sticking to his studies this year and did not consent to play until last week end.

GEORGETOWN LIONS are now tied with Acton for second place in the Halton Juvenile loop, Milton being the league leaders. At a game here last Thursday night Georgetown defeated Milton by an 8-3 score. Acton will visit Georgetown to-morrow night at the arena here, and it should be a good game, as the winner will be awarded second standing in the group. Come out and help the boys.
