of projects for which appropriations have been made in previous sessions; roads and tourist highways, rehabilitation works in the West, national parks, harbor developments, airports, elimination of level crossings, mining roads, etc.

The National Housing Act—home improvement plans and the act aiding municipalities in self liquidating projects will continue to play their part in stimulating employment in the building trade.

Trade Treaties

The principle of British preference is strengthened rather than weakened by Washington last November, the minister of trade and commerce, Mr. Eiler told the house in a vigorous defence of the United States agreement. There will be a full dress debate on this pact when it is put before the house for approval.

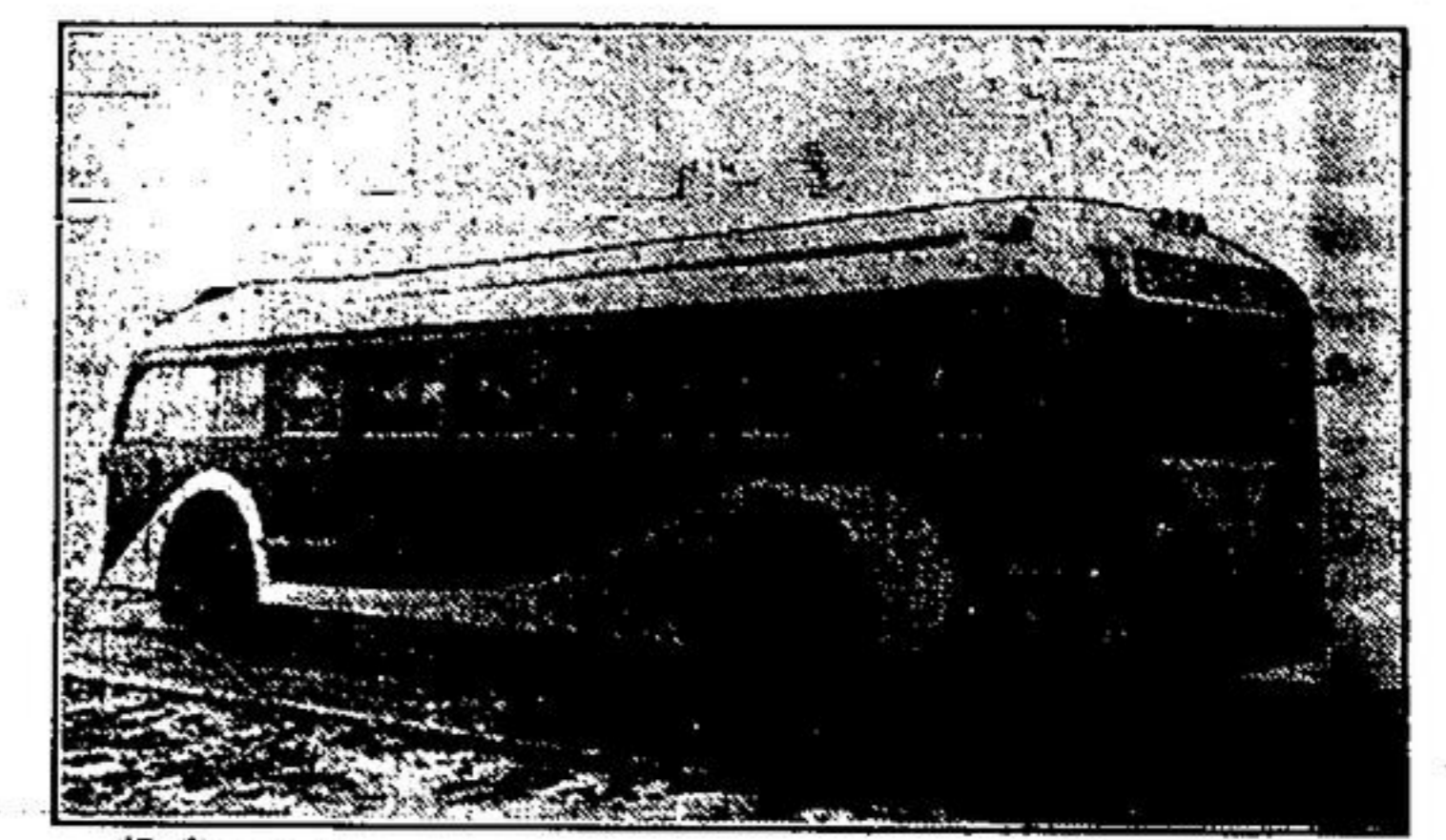

Progress of Welding

Welding is the process of joining together two pieces of metal by the application of intense localized heat. Prior to the introduction of modern welding practice metal sheets were joined by forge welding—a process confined to relatively small objects or by the use of bolts and rivets which inevitably resulted in large, clumsy, excessively heavy structures. The various techniques that have been employed to effect the joining of metals by the application of localized heat can be roughly classified into six categories. One of the earliest forms of welding and one that is in common use because of the simple equipment necessary is gas welding. Here the heat necessary to fuse the metal parts is supplied by the burning of oxygen and acetylene.

The Passion Flower

The three leaves of the passion flower that grow in a cluster represent the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. The tendrils are the thorns with which Christ was bound. The various parts of the flower—stamens, pistil, sepals and petals—represent the crown of thorns, the three nail prints, the five wounds, the three spears, the two clubs and the cross. The ten pods represent the Apostles, excluding Judas, who betrayed Christ, and Peter, who denied Him.
