Parents Bring Son and Pal Back to Jail

Mr. and Mrs. W. Lazo, parents of Joseph Lazo, who escaped with two companions from Halton county jail early Monday, brought their son back to justice on Tuesday.

Lazo appeared at his parents' home in Hamilton early Tuesday morning accompanied by Harvey Matthews, 28, of Simcoe, who had escaped with him from the jail. At 9 a.m. Mr. and Mrs. Lazo surrendered the two young men jail authorities after driving them from Hamilton.

The two young men were locked up in ground floor cells. They had escaped from second floor cells, after smashing a hole through the jail roof with a file.

Richard Sharpe, alias George White, 22, of Toronto—the third prisoner who escaped, is still missing. He was awaiting trial on forgery charges.

Lazo was serving 12 months definite and 12 months indeterminate for breaking and entering and larceny, three months definite and two months indeterminate for car theft. After delivering their son and Matthews to the jail, Mr. and Mrs. Lazo returned to Hamilton.

Governor Frank McNiven of the jail and Provincial Constable A. J. Oliver questioned the returned fugitives for an hour regarding the whereabouts of Sharpe.

Jails Inspector R. McJannett, who conducted the investigation, said today the men used a small file to crash through the jail roof. The men had broken out of their cells and climbed through the ceiling after smashing a plumb line that went to the roof.

According to Sheriff W. L. Hampshire of Milton, the inspector had the three locks removed from the cell doors and ordered them examined by a locksmith.

TORONTO ACTRESS IS WED OVERSEAS

Elaine Wodson becomes Mrs. Douglas Seale

Elaine Wodson, now in the Howard and Wyndham Repertory Co. in Glasgow and Edinburgh, was married this week to Douglas Seale, one of the actors in the company. She is the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Wodson of Toronto.

She made her Canadian reputation in Hart House theatre. A few years ago she went to London to study in Academy of Dramatic Art. As soon as she graduated she began a series of engagements with repertory companies, one of which last year she toured Scandinavia.

She is already a popular actress on the British stage, perhaps the best known of a number of young Canadian actorfolk who had to go abroad, either to the U.S. or to England, for professional engagements. — Toronto Daily Star, Feb. 11th.
