Leading Agriculturalists Speak at Seed Fair

Soil Testing Urged Before Planting Crops—Farmers 100 Possibilities of These Days Says One

Speaking at the annual Seed Fair of Halton County, held this year in Milton, on Saturday last, Dr. Gordon McRostie, head of the field husbandry department, O.A.C., said that the secret of O.A.C. success is "getting an adapted variety in the right place." He said plants and humans are alike in the sense that one person will thrive on a certain food, while another will not. The speaker strongly advised Halton farmers to test soils by planting several varieties of grain to find the type adapted to the particular locality. He pointed out that one type of wheat, oats or other grain could be an utter failure in certain areas, but that another variety might be found to flourish. Full co-operation of O.A.C. experts would be given farmers who forward their findings to the college.

"There are too many farmers today who lean up against the barn door and exclaim, 'What's the use, there is no money in farming!'" Professor Norman Thomas, chemistry department, O.A.C., asserted, "adding there was still success to be made by the aggressive farmer, despite frequent reports to the contrary, he added, 'I call these farmers who lean up against barn doors 'unemployed farmers.' The Lord helps those who help themselves, and those who won't have no place in farming."

He was aware Halton Crop Improvement association had requested the department of agriculture, recently, to co-operate in conducting a soil survey of the county. He stated that in 1937, the province had analyzed 25 types of soil, was found to be deficient where phosphorus was concerned. The larger part of Halton was found also to be low in organic matter, although this condition did not hold above the escarpment.

Prof Thomas said that perhaps, in the case of worn-out soils, farmers were "mining" taking everything out, rather than farming. He declared he was not going to recommend farmers buy fertilizers as a cure-all for worn-out soils, "as there are too many agents running up and down the country, and sufficient farmers signing on the dotted line. 'See that for every dollar you spend on fertilizer, you get more than \$1 out of your investment. Do a little of your own business without letting feed and fertilizer agents do it all for you," he concluded.

"PYGMALION" WINS ACADEMY AWARD

"Pygmalion," film adaptation of the famous stage success by Bernard Shaw, which opens at the Royal Theatre in Guelph on Tuesday for a four day engagement, won the Academy Award as the "best written screen play of the year." "Pygmalion" is the first picture to be nominated for five Academy Awards, the first for Leslie Howard's best performance by an actor; the second for the sensational new screen find Wendy Hiller, best performance by an actress; the third for the best written screen play; the fourth for the best written dialogue, and fifth for the best picture of the year.

This attraction also won the Volpi Cup award following its showing at the International Film Festival held in Venice. The award was made to Leslie Howard for his interpretation of the professor in the Shaw comedy, and to Wendy Hiller for her performance. Also honored was Gabriel Pascal, producer of "Pygmalion," for the "best producing."

CANADIAN NATIONAL

SCHOOL CHILDREN SHOULD BE TAUGHT GAME AND FISH CONSERVATION

Advancing the cause of game and fish conservation in Ontario by teaching the principles of conservation to the school children of the province was urged by D. J. Taylor, deputy minister of game and fisheries for Ontario, in the course of an address at the annual banquet of the Halton Game and Fish Protective Association, held last week at Oakville. "If we could get in touch with the rising generation," said Mr. Taylor, "half the prevention necessary today would be unnecessary ten or fifteen years from now. It is our duty to perpetuate the fine recreational privileges we have of hunting and shooting, and we should do everything to perpetuate the tremendous tourist trade we have attracted, no doubt by our game and fish." He called attention to the great importance of the tourist trade to Ontario, pointing out that in the northern part of the province caterers to tourists employed 46,000 people, and had an annual pay-roll of \$1,500,000.

cornerstones of the new pain but the full provisions will not be known until the government's plans are complete and have been placed before the house. During the past week a large delegation (with Premier Bracken of Manitoba) representing grain interests of the three prairie provinces presented a brief to the government in which the continuance of the wheat board plan and of the 80 cent guarantee for the 1939-40 period were urged. A number of other suggestions were included in the brief which our limited space does not allow a full description.

Broadcasting Corporation Affairs
The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation is unloathed and unappreciated in any manner by public, Mr. Brockington, president of the O.B.C., told a special committee of the Commons which has started its annual review of the corporation's affairs. The corporation and its board of governors assumed full responsibility for the policy and administration of the radio corporation. Giving an impressive description of the growing activities of the corporation, Mr. Brockington said all features of the Royal visit would be carried over the radio network, that a more extensive broadcast of news

from the Canadian Press would be heard hereafter and that there would be an exchange of programs with the national system in Newfoundland. Two new high powered stations would soon be in operation, one at Sackville, New Brunswick, the other at Watrous, Saskatchewan. The government had been asked for aid to construct a new station near Windsor, Ontario, to increase the coverage in Southwestern Ontario. That section has been troubled with interference from Mexico. British Columbia was another part of the Dominion still inadequately covered. The C. B. C. programs reach only two thirds of the population. The mountainous country was partly responsible. An immediate study of the whole situation in B.C. would be begun.
