BY-LAW NO. —

TO AMEND WATERWORKS BY-LAW NUMBER 112A
Be it enacted by this Municipal Council that the section of By-Law Number 112A passed the 31st day of May, 1932, be amended by striking out the fee of \$2.00 for use of hose for garden, lawn or washing car, so that there will be no extra charge for this service.

BY-LAW NO. —

To amend the existing by-law for taxing, restraining and regulating the running at large of dogs within the Municipality of the Town of Georgetown, passed on the 12th day of April, 1927, being By-law No. —
WHEREAS it is provided by Section 5 of the "Dog Tax and Sheep Protection Act, 1927, Chapter 335," that by-laws may be passed by the Municipal Council requiring the registration of dogs,
AND WHEREAS in the by-law above referred to, no provision is made compelling owners of dogs to register them,
AND WHEREAS it is deemed advisable that some such provision should be inserted in the existing by-law,
NOW, THEREFORE, the Municipal Council of the Town of Georgetown, in council assembled, and in accordance with the provision of the "Dog Tax and Sheep Protection Act," above referred to, enacts as follows:
1. Section 4 of the by-law above referred to, being by-law No. — is hereby amended by adding thereto sub-section 3 (a) which is as follows: "Every owner, possessor or keeper of any dog who has not procured a license for the same shall on or before the 30th day of April in each year, furnish the Clerk or the Tax Collector with full particulars of any such dog and the description thereof, sufficient to identify such dog or dogs and for any false statement in respect thereof or failure to do so shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$10.00, recoverable in the same manner as other penalties provided for in the said by-law."
In all other respects the existing by-law is ratified and confirmed.
Passed this 7th day of March, A.D. 1939.

"COMMERCIAL INTEREST" IN DANGER, CLERGYMAN TELLS CONGREGATION

"Moving pictures and radio should be carefully controlled because of their great influence on the life of growing youth," Rev. D. H. Gallagher told the congregation of St. John's United Church, Oakville, at the evening service Sunday.
"The danger of modern entertainment is the emphasis on the commercial interest," Mr. Gallagher said. "The door receipts often dictate the type of entertainment and may not be of the highest standard. Religion is not a kill-joy but a challenge to seek the highest type of amusement and pleasure," he said. The sermon was entitled "pleasure without conscience" and was third in a series on the "seven deadly sins."
