The Tourist Business

The popularity of Canada among tourists is shown by the fact that 17 million visitors came to the Dominion during 1938. It is estimated that these visitors spent approximately \$269,000,000 in Canada for goods and services. During last year sportsmen paid \$600,000 for licenses in Canada and spent about \$25,000,000 for supplies and services. Last year conventions held in the principal centres across Canada numbered 981, producing an estimated revenue of \$24,000,000, a fair increase over the previous year. While this tourist trade is encouraging, it but reveals that great potential development available in Canada along this line, and should make every citizen interested in supporting the work that is being done by Federal and Provincial governments, civic organizations, transportation companies, tourist bureaus, etc.

Indicative of the work that is going forward by provincial governments for attracting tourists, it is pointed out that continuous highway improvement is being made in Ontario, while Quebec has a splendid highway encircling the Gaspé Peninsula and improvements are under way in other areas. Nova Scotia has all main highways hard-surfaced and New Brunswick is doing good work in this direction, while Prince Edward Island is also improving the roads. Every industry is affected by the influx of visitors, with transportation companies,

hotels, restaurants, manufacturers, retail stores, agriculture and many others benefiting from our tourist trade. The tourist dollar is spread over a large proportion of our population, and everything possible should be done to encourage tourists to visit Canada, and when they do come they should be warmly welcomed, so that they will tell their friends and relatives of the hospitality of Canadians on their return to their homes.

TO KILL MOTHS IN FURS

Research work has shown that moth larvae in furs are most effectively killed by repeated exposures to sudden changes in temperature, known as the "shock" method. Approved procedure calls for refrigeration of furs after cleaning, first to a temperature of 15 to 18 degrees Fahrenheit. After two or three days at these temperatures, furs are exposed to 45 to 50 degrees Fahrenheit. It was found that the duplication of this process two or three times kills all moths, eggs and larvae. The highest relative humidity for the storage of furs has been found to be from 55 to 65 per cent. Although well developed moth larvae may withstand a temperature of 18 degrees Fahrenheit for a long period of time, with the possibility of changing from a dormant to an active state when temperatures return to normal, the repeated exposures to extremes within the 15 to 50 degrees Fahrenheit range, are fatal for all moth larvae endangering furs.

COLD STORAGE CARROTS

Carrots are well adapted for storage and lose little of their eating quality, even after prolonged storage. In a recently published scientific work, it is stated that, contrary to common belief, the eating quality of old carrots is equal to, if not better than, that of young carrots, since sweetness increases with age, while the fibre content remains practically unchanged. Carrots can be held in storage for six months without serious deterioration, provided the temperature is maintained between 32 and 40 degrees Fahrenheit and the relative humidity above 90 per cent.
