COLD STORAGE CARROTS

Carrots are well adapted for storage and lose little of their eating quality, even after prolonged storage. In a recently published scientific work, it is stated that, contrary to common belief, the eating quality of old carrots is equal to, if not better then, that of young carrots, since sweetness increases with age, while the fibre content remains practically unchanged. Carrots can be held in storage for six months without serious deteri-

oration, provided the temperature is maintained between 32 and 40 degrees Pahrenheit and the relative humidity above 90 per cent.
